

## PREFACE

Raja Narendra Lal Khan Women's College is a rural college situated in a backward junglemahal area of Kankabati Gram Panchayat, Paschim Medinipur district. Out of 3444 students, more than 70% of the students hail from villages and nearly 45% students belong to SC/ST/OBC and minority communities. The administrative building of the College-the Gope Palace was built during the time of Raja Narendra Lal Khan, the king of Narajole in 1895. Due to the active role of his son Raja Debendra Lal Khan in the freedom movement and as a member of the Indian National Congress, this palace was visited by many stalwarts like **Mahatma Gandhi who stayed in this palace twice, Deshbandhu Chittaranjan Das, Pandit Jawahar Lal Nehru, Netaji Subhas Chandra Bose, Smt Kamala Nehru and Smt Indira Gandhi. Paintings by Hemchandra Kanungo, the famous revolutionary are displayed in the palace along with many rare photographs and antique items. Eminent scholars and writers like Acharya Prafullya Chandra Roy and Sri. Sarat Chandra Chattopadhya also visited this palace. The palace has been declared as a Heritage Building by the West Bengal Heritage Commission (Act IX of 2001).** 

The College has twenty two undergraduate and one post graduate departments offering honours and general courses in Science and Arts. The college has displayed significant growth in terms of infrastructure and in the academic with a vibrant research unit. At present, it is one of the best women's college in West Bengal and in recognition of its achievements NAAC has accredited the college as 'A' grade twice in 2004 and 2011, the College is recognized as a –Centre with Potential for Excellencell by UGC, science departments have received the prestigious DST FIST and has been selected as 'STAR' college by DBT, Govt. of India. The college has its own Counselling, Training and Placement cell offering psychological counseling, career counseling, value added courses, entrepreneurship development programmes and conducting campus placement drives Mandatory computer course and spoken English course for all students have been initiated, students are given access to e-learning lab and language lab for reference work and to enhance communicative skills. The college hosts Study Centre of Netaji Subhas Open University, where 14 UG and 10 PG courses are running having about 4000 students.

The College was assessed and accredited by National Assessment and Accreditation Council (NAAC), Bangalore for the first cycle in September, 2003 and awarded an \_A' Grade on **2004.** The Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) was established on the recommendations of the Peer Team for enhancing the quality of academics in the college on 3<sup>rd</sup> March, 2005. The college was assessed and accredited for its second cycle by NAAC, Bangalore from 7<sup>th</sup> to 9<sup>th</sup> February, 2011 and was subsequently awarded \_A' Grade with **3.1** CGPA.

During the past few years, NAAC peer Team recommendations were attended to and the college has made tireless efforts to comply with those recommendations. The peer Team recommendations allowed the college to introspect and improve on quality parameters. A more functional IQAC with defined roles and responsibilities was a major initiative taken by the college. More teachers were involved in preparing the SSR along with the IQAC. Introspections and discussions amongst teachers have helped in preparing a precise Self Study Report (SSR).

The college has witnessed many changes during the last five years. Some experienced teachers retired and the next generation of teachers have taken over the responsibility of carrying forward the tradition and legacy of the college. Some new academic programmes like B.A. in Human Rights and Certificate courses in Soft Toy making, Art and Craft were initiated and are being conducted successfully. This has also given an opportunity to invite and interact with experts from various fields who shared their knowledge and helped in expanding our academic horizons and enhancing the overall quality of teaching-learning. Resource mobilization from various funding agencies was taken up as a major strategy to improve the infrastructure, augment teaching-learning facilities and allocate projects to students to make learning more \_student centric'. Funds from CPE-UGC and DST-FIST (Ministry of Science and Technology) has helped the college in enhancing the infrastructure for teaching and research. Programmes like DBT (Department of Biotechnology, Ministry of Science and Technology)-STAR scheme have focussed on additional skill development amongst undergraduate students. Research endeavors have been geared up in the last five years with increased participation of students and teachers in research with a greater number of major and minor research projects being funded by different funding agencies. The preparation of SSR involved teamwork and the members have taken efforts to prepare the SSR. The SSR includes the Preface and cover letter, Executive Summary, SWOC of the institution, Profile of the college, Criterion wise inputs, Evaluative Report of the Departments, Post Accreditation Initiatives, Annexure supporting the data, Declaration by the Head of the Institution and Certificate of Compliance. The SSR has been shared with teachers, students and the management at every stage of its preparation and finalization.

I take this opportunity to express my sincere thanks to each and every individual colleague for their valuable contribution in preparing the SSR. I express my deep sense of gratitude to the President of the Governing Body and all members of the Governing Body for their constant support in all the endeavors of the college. I would also like to acknowledge the tireless efforts of the IQAC members and all seven Criteria In-Charges, Heads of Departments, Members of the Steering Committee and all teachers for their support in our journey towards excellence. Syllabus of the undergraduate and post graduate courses have been revised in 2014 by the affiliating university.



• Help Desk including a computer centre is maintained for the students to assist them during online admission process.

Apart from the lecture method, many other methods are used to enrich the teaching learning process. Emphasis has been given to the use of ICT and modern tools in teaching. Seventeen smart classes have been set up. Number of LCD projectors has increased from just two to twenty four.

♦ Up-gradation of all science laboratories with procurement of equipments have been done from CPE, DST-FIST, BSR, DBT STAR and RUSA funds.

✤ Field trips, excursions and student projects have been conducted on a regular basis in the last five years


• During the last five years the feedback mechanism has been strengthened by incorporating analysis of feedback by professionals.


• Biometric system of attendance resulting in a sustainable development in academic atmosphere has been introduced.


• Uniform Academic Calendar provided by the university is strictly followed and Academic Sub-Committee monitors that the calendar is strictly adhered to.



Continuous assessment with weightage of 10% has been introduced by Vidyasagar University and is being strictly followed under the monitoring of Academic Committee.






Graph 3 and 4: First class obtained by our students in the last five years


## Criterion - III: Research, Consultancy and Extension-



## **Criterion – IV: Infrastructure and learning Resource:**

• Built up area has considerably increased due to construction of additional Infrastructure viz, first and second floor (ongoing) of Nutrition Building (Grant from Govt. of W.B) and first and second floor of Central Library (UGC grant) and Construction of one new non teaching quarter (Grant from Govt. of W.B). Extension and up-gradation of Departments of Zoology, Botany, Physiology, Microbiology, Chemistry, Physics, Mathematics, Geography laboratories (BSR fund), Constructions of one Cycle Stand in the main campus and one each adjacent to the five hostels (College fund), Animal House (College fund), Auditorium and Gymnasium (UGC) have been undertaken. Construction of boundary wall around the hostels (College fund), 100 seated Women's Hostel (UGC) have been completed.

• Renovation of Sarada Bhaban (hostel) has been done.

• Modernization of all science laboratories has been made by procuring equipments from XI<sup>th</sup> plan-UGC, UGC-CPE, BSR, DST-FIST and DBT-STAR.

• All pipelines in the hostels have been replaced by PVC pipes.

• A play ground with all outdoor games facilities and stadium has been developed.

• The college as a whole has more than 221 computers with application softwares like Ms-Office and statistical packages including latest versions of SPSS, Matlab and Origin etc.

• Seventeen smart classrooms, Thirty three laboratories, twenty four LCD projectors are available in the college.

• Regular training facilities are provided by the computer centre for the staff members and students at nominal cost.

• Medical unit has been strengthened by enhancing and ensuring some facilities such as regular health check up programme and issuing health card to the students. A gynecologist visits the hostels on a weekly basis and a full time Homeopathic doctor has been engaged for the hostel boarders.

• Students Hostels are provided with all sorts of sports and recreational facilities-indoor games, outdoor sports facility, magazine, dailies, TV, internet facility and library access.

## Criterion - V: Student support and progression-

Student intake capacity in the UG and PG courses has been increased from 2395 (2010-11) to 3444 (2015-16), more than 70% of the students hail from rural areas and nearly 45% of the students come from weaker sections of the society.

▶ No. of students qualifying in NET/SET/GATE are increasing. At least 35% of the students get absorbed through state school service commission.

 $\succ$  Financial Assistance is provided to poor meritorious students and/or SC/ST and students belonging to backward Community in the form of full free/half free scholarships and exemption of tuition or hostel fees. Scholarship help desk has been esrablished for assisting students to obtain scholarships.

## **Curriculum Planning and Implementation**

## State the vision, mission and objectives of the institution, and describe how these are communicated to the students, teachers, staff and other stakeholders.

The vision of the College is to empower women by enhancing their inner potentialities and inculcating in them the idea of Complete Womanhood while imparting self-respect and confidence for upholding the rights and privileges of women in the society.

The motto of this institution is to substantiate Swami Vivekananda's ideal –Education is the unfoldment of Divinity in Man

Our institutional mission is to enkindle a spirit of nationalism in the heart of each of its students and staff so that they stand out in society as torchbearers of the true human spirit and are hailed as proud and worthy Indians. The objective is to produce intellectually developed, morally upright, socially conscious and spiritually oriented young women ready to serve society and the nation.

The students of this College are equipped to meet the challenges of a fast changing world through a well-balanced blend of traditional and innovative academic programmes.

All the stakeholders are made aware of the vision, mission and objective through the College Prospectus, College Website, Classroom Teaching, Interactive Sessions ; extra-academic programmes like the College Foundation Day function, Alumni \_get-together' and the Annual Sports Meet. In addition, the college also observes different important days like Swami Vivekanada's Birth Day, Netaji Subhas Chandra Boses's birth Day, Republic Day, Kabiguru Rabindranath Thakur's birth Day, Independence Day etc. with due respect and cordial effort. The contributions of these great men are conveyed to motivate them and to inculcate in them the spirit of nationalism and the ideal of good citizenship. Through these programmes they are also made familiar to the bright tradition and rich heritage of the college to make them proud and loyal to the institute that, in turn, orient and motivates them to fulfill the mission of this college.

The Principal of the College addresses the college freshers for a general orientation where the vision and mission of the College is conveyed by highlighting the academic as well as extracurricular aspect.

The Principal as well as the departmental faculties also periodically meet the students to encourage them to strive not only for academic excellence but also for all round development by making them aware that they constitute a part of the rich heritage borne by this College. Departmental meetings of the staff members are organised along with the students where the students are repeatedly reminded of the vision, mission and rich heritage of the college.

The Students Union of the College organises a programme to welcome the freshers wherein the newcomers are made aware about the mission and vision of the College.

Through our well-planned and periodic parent-teacher meet, the parents and guardians develop a sense of belonging towards the Institution. It clearly delineates the mission and goal of the College and generates an awareness of its prestigious heritage. Posters and hoardings stating the mission and vision of the College are displayed in the College campus.

## Self Study Report-2016 How does the institution develop and deploy action plans for effective implementation of the curriculum? Give details of the process and substantiate through specific example(s).

The institution implements the curricula designed by the Affiliating University. But to effectively implement the curriculum the teachers and management devise an action plan in the beginning of the session through the Academic Sub-committee.

The Academic Sub-committee prepares an academic plan for the ensuing session, keeping in mind the academic calendar issued by the parent University. Teaching Departments are advised to prepare lesson plans by unitising the syllabus. The plan includes not only the syllabus to be covered but also the time for holding internal assessment, seminars by visiting teachers, student seminars, and remedial classes especially for the weak students and tutorial classes for the slow learners.

Professionally competent teachers, including guest teachers, impart quality teaching to the students. Progress is regularly monitored by standard in-house assessment procedures. Excursions/field trips are arranged on a regular basis. Participation of students in science fairs and educational exhibitions are encouraged. Seminars and workshops related to the curriculum are arranged for the benefit of students and teachers alike. Links with academia and industry are forged through personal initiative of the teachers and the placement cell of the college. Aspects of ecology and the environment are imbibed by the students during their course work and their projects. Facilities like free internet access even on holidays and Sundays by the Central Computer Centre and computers in different departments are provided to students who use them to hone their computational skills to meet their academic queries. The central library and departmental libraries are open to students for developing their knowledge skills. Teachers encourage and accompany the students to the central library and e-learning centre to augment classroom teaching. Counselling students is an integral part of the duties of a teacher in our college. Apart from that, there is a student counselling centre where professional counselling is provided to students who need it to overcome obstacles and challenges in their lives.

# What type of support (procedural and practical) do the teachers receive (from the University and/or institution) for effectively translating the curriculum and improving teaching practices?

The University prescribes the academic calendar at the beginning of the session and disseminates information regarding changes in curricula through periodic circulars. It invites teachers of affiliated colleges to participate in workshops on framing new syllabi. The UG syllabi in some subjects have undergone many modifications regarding prescribed texts and pattern of questions based on the suggestions made in these workshops.

The college provides the teachers with a disciplined and well-organized work environment. Teachers are encouraged to avail of faculty improvement programmes (orientation programmes, refresher courses, leave for research work, leave under FDP for PhD work, participation in seminar/workshops/conferences etc). Institutional support is provided to teachers who are engaged in minor and major research projects, funded by UGC and DST or other funding agencies. For improving effective teaching practices, ICT support is given by the institution to the teaching departments. All teaching departments are provided with desktop computers with internet connectivity. Smart Classrooms, LCD monitors and white boards are provided to departments for optimal uses of modern technology for effective class room teaching. Syllabus related seminars and workshops sponsored by different funding agencies like UGC, CPE and State Government are organised by the departments regularly for effective implementation of the curriculum. The college provides regular financial support for upgrading the central library and seminar libraries by acquiring new books, journal and reference materials

Specify the initiatives taken up or contribution made by the institution for effective curriculum delivery and transaction on the Curriculum provided by the affiliating University or other statutory agency.

For UG courses the Vidyasagar University frames the syllabi for UG courses and the curricula, and the college has to follow it in its entirety. However the Affiliating University obtains inputs from teachers of colleges for devising and revising curricula keeping in view of the latest trends. Teachers of this college participate robustly in this activity. A number of senior teachers of this college are members of the Board of Studies of the university and they contribute as members of the curriculum revision team in their respective subject. Teachers also take part in curriculum related workshops organised by the university.

At the institutional level periodic review through the Academic Subcommittee is made for effective curriculum delivery and transaction of the curriculum provided by the affiliating University.

Continuous evaluation is carried out at a regular basis by means of classroom interaction, tutorial classes and audio-visual presentation by the students on different topics included in the curriculum. Participation of students in various project works assigned to them related to different issues included in the curriculum also helps in analysing and ensuring the effective delivery and transaction of the objectives of the curriculum.

## How does the institution network and interact with beneficiaries such as industry, research bodies and the university in effective operationalisation of the curriculum?

The teachers of the college are encouraged to maintain constant link with the Board of studies at the University. At Institutional level teachers are urged to take membership of research bodies of their respective subject and are encouraged to visit reputed libraries for effective operationalisation of the curriculum. Teachers and students participate in seminars and workshops held by Vidyasagar University to implement and substantiate the syllabus.

Members of the teaching staff, numbering about ten, are active as members of the various Boards of Study (in different disciplines) in the Affiliating University, and autonomous colleges. Their feedback forms an important component of improvement and innovation in the course content and its implementation by the university. Parents are encouraged to give their feedback about the curriculum through a given format every year before the parent meet. The feedback is discussed

in the meeting with parent of students. Student feedback is taken formally at the final year as by then students have their mature opinion about the implementation of the syllabus. The response of the parents and students on curricula is fed back to the appropriate bodies in the university through senior teachers of the college on the Board of Studies and those who are involved in workshops on syllabus revision. Some of the senior teachers serve as experts on curriculum design.

Does the institution develop curriculum for any of the courses offered (other than those under the purview of the affiliating university) by it? If \_yes', give details on the process ('Needs Assessment', design, development and planning) and the courses for which the curriculum has been developed.

Yes. The college develops the curricula of Certificate Courses on i. Communicative English & Soft Skill ii. Computer Application and Information Technology iii. Computer Application and Financial Accounting iv. Dance v. Art and Craft. Extensive planning goes into framing up-to-date syllabi and curricula which meet the need of the Stake holders. Feedback from students, teachers, parents, other stakeholders, experts and well-wishers are obtained. A \_need-assessment' exercise with regard to students is taken up during student interactions and parent meet. The relevance of the course and its usefulness with respect to employability in different sectors are taken into account before finalizing the curriculum. Regular feedback from all quarters is obtained, recorded and kept for reference and future action.

## Annexure 3: Curricula of certificate courses designed by the institution

The college has Training, Counselling cum Placement Cell which plays a crucial role in need based analysis of the courses and forms a committee for designing of syllabus and detail planning for execution of the course. Faculty members of Department of Computer Science and Mathematics are involved in designing the curriculum in Computer Application and Information Technology and faculty members of Department of BCA and Physics are involved in designing the course on Computer Application and financial Accounting. Course on Communicative English & Soft Skill is designed and developed by the faculty members of the Department of English. Teachers well qualified in Dance from different departments, faculty members of the Departments of Music, faculty members of different departments having requisite qualificationand expertise in Dance and external experts are involved in the development of curriculum for the course on Dance.

### How does the institution analyze/ensure that the stated objectives of curriculum are achieved in the course of implementation?

Periodic meeting of the Academic Sub-committee is held in the college to monitor the progress of the curriculum taught by departments. All Heads of Departments are members of the Academic Sub-committee.

Performances of the students in Internal Assessments are deliberated over by the Heads and Senior Faculty at the departmental level. Any serious anomalies are addressed in departmental meetings and contact levels are intensified at the class and tutorial levels to smoothen out the difficulties.

Performance at the level of the university examinations are discussed at the Academic Committee Meetings. Cases requiring considerations are deliberated upon and attempts are made to ascertain whether curricula was effectively implemented or whether strategies have to be revised, whether a particular student had reception problems or whether student-teacher contact level needed to be re-negotiated or infrastructural problems including manpower needs to addressed. Implementation strategies are debated over in the Governing Body level if such a need arises.

#### Academic Flexibility

Certificate Courses on i. Communicative English & Soft Skills ii. Computer Application and Information Technology iii. Computer Application and Financial Accounting iv. Dance v. Art and craft have been designed with some specific goals and objectives. Courses on computers and Soft skill have been designed to increase the computational skill of the students to equip them with modern computer skills so that they can use it for academic and/or as a future career option in software or accounting. Soft skill, help the students to communicate more efficiently increasing their employability. Certificate courses in Dance and Art and Craft are designed keeping in consideration self employment and/or entrepreneurship development opportunities in the respective field.

#### Give details on the various institutional provisions with reference to academic flexibility and how it has been helpful to students in terms of skills development, academic mobility, progression to higher studies and improved potential for employability

**Range of Core /Elective options offered by the University and those opted by the college:** The College being affiliated to the Vidyasagar University follows all the rules and regulations stipulated by it for the UG courses and hence there is little scope for flexibility. The PG course in Zoology has been made autonomous with effect from the session-2015-16 and enjoys academic flexibility. Options regarding subject combinations, offered by the university are offered to the students of this college as far as possible within the infrastructure of the college.

**Courses offered in modular form:** Courses offered under Netaji Subhas Open University are in modular form. There is very little scope to change the syllabus, generated by the parent

university. For better teaching, UG courses are divided in different modules by some departments during the formulation of lesson plan.

Choice Based Credit System not available.

Credit transfer and accumulation facility: There is no opportunity for credit transfer.

Lateral and vertical mobility within and across programmes and courses are not available.

Credit transfer and accumulation facility is not available under Vidyasagar University.

**Enrichment courses-** Communicative English & Soft Skills and courses on Computer Application are conducted along with preparatory courses for competitive examinations. Honing the skills and knowledge that the students acquire from their formal degree these courses greatly improve their employability potential as these courses are tailor-made keeping in view the skill gaps and needs of the industry and to increase the employability skill of the students. Preparatory courses on SSC, WBCS and NET are also conducted by the Training and Placement Cell beyond college hours and on holidays with the help of professional teachers.

## Does the institution offer self-financed programmes? If \_yes', list them and indicate how they differ from other programmes, with reference to admission, curriculum, fee structure, teacher qualification, salary etc.

Partly Self-financed UG courses in Microbiology, Computer Application, Computer Science, Nutrition and Physical Education are offered by the College. These courses are only partly self-financed since the State Government provides financial support by paying the remuneration of the contractual whole time and Government approved part-time teachers.

Admission: Online, with criteria laid out by every department.

Curriculum: UG courses follow the University prescribed syllabi.

Fee Structure: The fee structure is determined by the college following certain norms laid out by the University and the State Government.

Teacher Qualification: As per UGC regulations as far as practicable.

Salary: As per State Government rules.

Yes. Communicative English & Soft Skills, Courses on Computer Application, Art and Craft and a programme on entrepreneurship development in Ornamental Fishery are conducted. These courses are open to all students of the college. Hands on Computer- an introductory course has been made mandatory for all students of this college. Programme in Ornamental Fishery has beneficiaries which include rural women, NGO and our present and past students.

No, there is no provision for such flexibility under the regulations of the Vidyasagar University.



The College being affiliated to the Vidyasagar University does not have the option of formulating its own curriculum. This happens only to a limited extent. Still, the courses offered have their relevance to the institutional goals and objectives. The college aims to inculcate the highest intellectual standards through rigorous academic commitment and discipline. Students are inspired to aspire for higher level of academic achievement by mastering their chosen subject. The institution strives towards overall development of students and quality enhancement of learners through various aspects of holistic personality development, orientation programs and life skill enrichment programs conducted during their period of studies that focuses on managerial skills, communication skills, leadership qualities, analytical skills, etiquettes, group discussion, global warming, awareness on environment through seminars, moral and ethical values, role and scope of women in uplifting the society. The College ensures that the University curriculum is followed in the best spirit. The College academic calendar is prepared every session with the active involvement of the College Examination Committee and Heads of the Departments. The Principal makes sure that the curriculum framed by the University is supplemented in such a way that it reflects the mission and vision of the Institution. Seminars are conducted by the departments to enhance classroom learning and to enlarge the range of their awareness, concerns and expertise. Regular feedback obtained from the stakeholders, with respect to the quality of the enrichment programmes is monitored and evaluated by the Academic Committee and IOAC and necessary remedial measures are incorporated accordingly. Equal Opportunity Centre organizes workshops to create an environment of barrier free education.

## What are the efforts made by the institution to modify, enrich and organize the curriculum to explicitly reflect the experiences of the students and cater to needs of the dynamic employment market?

The College, being affiliated to the University, does not have the option of formulating its own curriculum. Nevertheless, a sincere effort is continuously made to modify and enrich the curriculum to suit the intellectual requirements of students and make them competitive in today's world through the involvement of faculty, department and other stakeholders. University level: Faculty Members who are on Board of Studies take initiative to modify, enrich and organize the curriculum. As per UGC guidelines, Environment Science and Human Rights Education has been introduced at undergraduate level. Thus, the institution is redesigning courses that are relevant to the regional and national needs. At Institution level: The college has taken measures to cater to the global market needs based on the true assessment of strength and services offered in the campus. To develop the required skills, brainstorming sessions are held for the faculty to design the tools in the areas of spoken English, use of computers and providing in-depth knowledge in the respective subjects. The college has designed certificate courses in Computers and Communicative English and soft-skills to prepare the students for the dynamic employment market. All the departments in the College conduct seminars, workshops, group discussions and field visits to enrich the curriculum. Certificate Course in Spoken English has been introduced to provide the students of the region an opportunity to upgrade their communication skills in English so as to brighten their career prospects. Different quiz programmes are organised for the students to keep the students up-dated with current affairs. Mock interviews are also taken under the supervision of Career and Counselling Cell to make the students competent for the job market.

## Enumerate the efforts made by the institution to integrate the cross cutting issues such as Gender, Climate Change, Environmental Education, Human Rights, ICT etc., into the curriculum?

The College has always actively responded to the momentous issues of our society and sociopolitical environment of the world. To integrate the cross cutting issues like gender, climate change, environment education, human rights, ICT etc. into the curriculum, the college has established Women's Cell. Gender Sensitization and seminars on Gender Equity are organized to create awareness about Gender issues and promote gender equity Climate change: Extension lectures on Global warming, Ozone layer depletion, Ozone layer depletion, and Carbon emission are regularly held. –Environmental Studies as subject is taught as part of the university syllabus. Department of Human rights organizes workshops and seminars: Anti-Ragging Cell, Grievance Redressal Cell (GRC) are active in the college campus. Seminars on women\_s rights are organized and Human Rights Day is observed. ICT: The College has state-of-the-art infrastructure for imparting computer training. Mandatory computer course is being conducted. ICT is included in the curriculum of PG as well as UG classes of all computer sand classes of some interdisciplinary courses. This foundational knowledge of computers and technology training make the students a part of global information system and enhances their employability.

### What are the various value-added courses/enrichment programmes offered to ensure holistic development of students?

The following value added courses are offered by the college-

Certificate Courses on i. Communicative English & Soft Skills ii. Computer Application and Information Technology iii. Computer Application and Financial Accounting

iv. Dance v. Art and Craft. Other than these courses preparatory programmes for various competitive examinations are organised.

Our mission is to ensure holistic development of students. Our college is like a family with a strong sense of bonding and respect for the values and traditions of the institution. Utmost courtesy and a spirit of service is fostered in students and staff alike. These are the ingredients of the art of living together which encourages a wholesome community orientation.

Moral and Ethical Values: Through courses in Human Rights and various seminar, workshops

organized by the Equal Opportunuty Cell and Animal Ethical committee and through of observations of important days, moral value are inculcated into the students.

**Employablility and Life Skills**: The Placement Cell consist of Soft skill Trainers and Language Trainers. The Placement executive understands that the need of communication skills is vital for the students for better career options. Group Discussions, Power Point Presentations, Resume writing and Declamation Contests are held at regular intervals both in regional and English language in the institution. Career Counselling workshops are organized to orient the students. It is a regular practice of the institution to invite expert resource persons to conduct workshops on the development of interview competence among the students. Students are also allotted different responsibilities in organizing various events and activities such as cultural programmes, competitions, seminars, workshops etc. In this way, they improve their team building and organizational skills.

Better Caeer options: Career Advancement Centre functions as a career guidance centre disseminiating knowledge about different career options available to varios categories of students and equipping them with enrichment courses to increase their employability.

**Community Orientation**: Institution regularly organizes Blood Donation Camp, AIDS awareness, Drug abuse, Environmental awareness programs, and observes World Water day, Global warming in collaboration with NSS. The innovative certificate courses and the extension activities which instill social consciousness enrich the curriculum and ensure holistic development of students. Different Blood tests like Thalassemia etc., training on first aid are also carried out for the holistic development of the students.

### Citing a few examples enumerate on the extent of use of the feedback from stakeholders in enriching the curriculum?

The college has an active and continual feedback system through parent feedback and parentteacher meet and interaction, student feedback and alumni feedback. Parent feedback is taken every year in a format supplied to the parents before Parent meet. The feedback is discussed in the parent meet. A report is prepared by the convener of the parent meet committee which is discussed in the IQAC and a detailed report is sent to Governing Body if and when necessary actions are required to be taken. Student feedback is taken from the final year students every year, the feedback is analysed and given to the respective teacher for introspection. Principal prepares a performance chart and takes necessary actions in this regard. Alumni feedback is also taken during departmental alumni meets and the central alumnae meet. Feedback from teachers is elicited largely at Teachers Council meetings. The faculty members take this very seriously and

participate with responsibility and discipline.

#### How does the institution monitor and evaluate the quality of its enrichment programmes?

The college uses education as the tool for empowering women and through the transaction of the enrichment programmes it has adopted it seeks to address the all-round development of the students enrolled in the various academic programs it offers. The feedback on various enrichment programmes in the form of interactions, discussions and suggestions as received through response sheets is analysed by external coordinators and a summative report of the same submitted to the Principal. The IQAC monitors and evaluates the efficiency and success of these enrichment programs. The Institution makes sure that the programmes offered in the curriculum include contribution to national development, fostering global competencies among students, inculcating a value system among students, promoting the use of technology and quest for excellence. The IQAC ensures that the students participate in these enrichment programmes and derive maximum benefit from them.

#### Feedback System

### What are the contributions of the institution in the design and development of the curriculum prepared by the University?

The responsibility of designing and restructuring of courses mainly lies with the Affiliating University. The college, however, makes significant contribution in the curriculum design and development. The existing courses are restructured and updated to meet the emerging national and global trends by reviewing periodically the syllabus of the reputed institutes, by organizing and attending seminars. Our faculty keep themselves abreast of the changing national and global trends by attending Refresher Courses and participating in seminars. In-house departmental meetings are held to review the courses and programmes. Feedback of students and their parents on the desired changes in the curriculum are obtained. The feedback thus obtained is analyzed. The Principal discusses the key findings with the Heads of the Departments. After thorough discussion a draft is prepared. Members of staff on statutory academic bodies communicate the suggestions/recommendations to the Board of Studies meeting held at the University for redesigning the programs for appropriate and effective inclusion by the university.

### Is there a formal mechanism to obtain feedback from students and made use internally for curriculum enrichment and introducing changes/new programmes?

The existing programs are reviewed and new programmes introduced to create better opportunities for students. Feedback from students, alumnae, parents, academic peers and community are obtained for formulation and introduction of new courses. a) Students: A Proforma based on NAAC recommendations has been designed to obtain feedback on curriculum. The Proforma is distributed through random selection of students. b) Alumni: Alumnae Meet which is a regular feature provides a platform to its old students to participate in college activities and give their valuable suggestions on curriculum. c) Parents: The feedback on curriculum is obtained during the Parent-Teacher Meet organized to apprise the parents with the performance of their ward and obtain their feedback on the functioning of the college. The feedback thus obtained is analysed. In-house departmental meetings are held to review the courses and programmes. The Principal discusses the key findings with the Heads of the Departments. Resolutions adopted after consultations are communicated to the University for Approval. The changes recommended in various courses are tabled in Board of Studies meetings

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by the member teachers for appropriate inclusion by the university. On the basis of these feedbacks, the present time table has been revised to facilitate completion of the syllabus on time.

### How many new programmes/courses were introduced by the institution during the last four years? What was the rationale for introducing new courses/programmes?

The college is growing from strength to strength in terms of the wide range of the curriculum offered at the undergraduate (UG) and postgraduate (PG) levels. The college offers a plethora of undergraduate courses in the faculty of Humanities, Science, Computers and Post graduation course in Zoology in tandem with the contemporary competitive educational scenario to empower women through quality education and make them job fit in the contemporary world. To sensitize students about their status and rights in society Human rights was introduced as an elective subject in B.A. The college is in the process of introduction of three PG courses from 2016 -17 academic session.

#### STUDENT ENROLLMENT AND PROFILE

#### How does the college ensure publicity and transparency in the admission process?

Raja N.L. Khan Women's college persistently and assiduously undertook all measures in pursuit of excellence in higher education. The earnest endeavour of the College is to ensure admission to all deserving and meritorious students and to implement this; the College takes utmost care to publicize its admission process in the leading local and national newspapers. In addition to this the College announces its admission process in the College website. A free and fair admission process is key to foster excellence in higher education, hence from 2015 onwards the college adopted full-fledged online admission process based on a transparent, open and excellence based meritocracy. At every stage the admission process of the college is scrutinized by online admission subcommittee of the college. Admissions to undergraduate programmes in the Faculties of Humanities, Biological Science and Pure Science are made on the basis of +2 performances. The college Prospectus describes the chief features of the Institution. Academic departments, the courses offered, as well as subject combinations and faculty members are enlisted in the Prospectus. The College website is the primary source of information for the Institution regarding the subjects offered, combination of subjects offered, departmental profiles, criteria and cutoff marks for admission in the various disciplines etc. It is regularly updated. The lists of applicants selected for different subjects are displayed in the College Notice Board as well as the College website. Successive vacancies and applicants selected against those vacancies are similarly displayed till the end of the admission process. All selections are made based strictly on merit and adhering to the guidelines and reservation policy of the government. Throughout the admission period a Help-desk is operative and any complaint or query from the applicants/guardians is immediately addressed. Such initiatives have been extremely useful in ensuring transparency and to boost the process of admission in the institution.

The Alumni Association also plays a vital role in dissemination of information regarding the college and the admission procedures followed.

#### Explain in detail the criteria adopted and process of admission [Ex. (i) merit (ii) common admission test conducted by state agencies and national agencies (iii) combination of merit and entrance test or merit, entrance test and interview (iv) any other] to various programs of the institution.

#### Undergraduate Admission:

Even though the college is keen to have entrance tests, the formidable logistic difficulties have held us back from this. Admission in the UG courses is strictly merit based. The merit is determined as per the following rules prescribed by the affiliating University i.e. Vidyasagar University and the State Higher Education Department.

• Students who pass Higher Secondary or equivalent examination(10+2) with minimum of 45% marks in the aggregate (to be calculated by adding the marks obtained in -Best Fivell subjects) or 50% marks in the subject or related subjects are eligible to apply for admission in the Honours course.

• Students carrying pass marks in at least five subjects are eligible to apply for admission in general course.

• Admission is done on merit basis. Merit point for admission in honours course is calculated by adding 10% of total marks obtained in the \_Best Five' subjects at higher secondary/ equivalent examination and the marks obtained in the subject or a related subject in which the admission in Honours course is sought.

• Merit point for admission in General Course is calculated by adding the marks obtained in \_Best Five' subjects at higher secondary/equivalent Examination.

• For admission in General and Honours course, a student must have passed Higher Secondary/ Equivalent examination from Boards approved by the Vidyasagar University.

- Students passing Higher Secondary Examination from Vocational stream, conducted by W.B.C.H.S. Education or any other equivalent Board/Council may apply for admission in General course only.
- Regarding admission in Nutrition (Hons) Course:- Only those students are eligible who have passed in i) Nutrition with Biology or Chemistry at Higher Secondary / equivalent examination. or, ii) Biology and / or Chemistry at Higher Secondary / equivalent examination.

#### Postgraduate Admission (PG-Zoology)

As per government rules, 40% of the available seats are filled based on merit of the applicants. Remaining 60% seats are filled through an entrance test comprising of 50 marks MCQ. The test is conducted by the college with effect from 2014.

The table clearly reflects that for the majority of the subjects, students admitted in our college have higher percentage in comparison to those admitted in neighboring college.

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Is there a mechanism in the institution to review the admission process and student profiles annually? If \_yes' what is the outcome of such an effort and how has it contributed to the improvement of the process?

The students profile is maintained by the departments concerned and the admission process is reviewed every year by the Admission Sub-committee, chaired by the Principal. Necessary changes to improve the process are suggested and concrete steps are taken. The Annual Reports keep track of student enrolment and performance. The success rate of our students in university examination is very high and failures are minimal.

## Reflecting on the strategies adopted to increase/improve access for following categories of students, enumerate on how the admission policy of the institution and its student profiles demonstrate/reflect the National commitment to diversity and inclusion

**SC/ST**: The reservation policy of the Govt. of West Bengal is followed with respect to admission of SC and ST category which is 22 percent and 6 percent respectively.

**OBC** (A) and **OBC** (B): From 2014 onwards, keeping in view, the new policy of the Govt. to increase the number of seats of OBC to 17 percent [OBC A-10% and OBC B-7%] over a period of 3 years keeping the total number of general seats intact, the college has increased required no. of seats in each course in a phase wise manner..

Women: The College is a women's college so this criterion does not apply separately.

**Differently abled**: 2% of available seats are reserved in each subject for students with special needs. A special cell looks into their needs, providing them all necessary help and guidance. Ramps and special toilets have been constructed and a lift for the library has been commissioned. **Economically weaker sections**: There is no provision for reservation of seats for students from economically weaker section. However, once a student from this section got admitted, the college authority extends every kind of support to such students to encourage them to complete the course. To reflect the national commitment to inclusion of the economically weaker section of the society, various stipends and scholarships [full/half] are awarded by the College on the basis of merit and financial needs. Free studentship (full/half) is awarded by the college to needy and deserving candidates on the recommendation of the department. Certain concessions in tuition and examination fees are awarded to the meritorious students. There is a scholarship help desk which assists the students in filling up online scholarship forms.

**Minority community**: Again there is no provision for reservation of seats for students from Minority Community. There are several Govt. and other scholarships for Minority community students once they get admission to this college.

**Any other:** Kanyashree Scholarships offered by the State Government for the deserving candidates have been introduced from the current academic year. Out of 1620 applicants 912 students received the scholarship in 2014-15.





On an average, the Demand Ratio for Science subjects in UG level like Zoology, Mathematics, and Physiology and in some of the Humanities subjects like English, Geography, Bengali, Sanskrit, it is high. In some subjects, like Political Science, History, Philosophy and Economics, due to various external reasons like lack of employability.

#### Catering to Diverse Needs of Students

### How does the institution cater to the needs of differently-abled students and ensure adherence to government policies in this regard?

The college is sensitive to the needs of the differently-abled students. The Institution strictly follows all Government rules and regulations regarding admission of the differently-abled students. The institution follows an inclusive policy and tries to extend all help and support to the differently-abled students. These students are provided all help and counselling when needed. They are given special guidance and counselling by the teachers of the respective departments. A special cell, HSEPN which has been established in the college with the aid of UGC provides necessary assistance like- wheel chair, computers for visually impaired etc. to help such students. Ramps have been constructed in all buildings. A proposal for installation of lift using RUSA fund has been sanctioned and will be shortly undertaken. Smt. Behula Maji, a non teaching staff member has been given the responsibility to assist the differently-abled students when required.

### Does the institution assess the students' needs in terms of knowledge and skills before the commencement of the programme? If \_yes', give details on the process.

Yes. The merit point for preparing the merit list for admission to each subject is based not only on the relevant subject but due importance is also given to the aggregate, so that merit of a student is judged by considering her achievement in other subjects also.

During admission there is a Help Desk to address the needs of the applicants and also to answer their queries. The students are counselled during admission to help them choose suitable subjects and courses. Before the commencement of a new programme, a deliberation by the Principal,

followed by the teachers of each department is organised for the students. Immediately after the commencement of class basic knowledge and shortcomings of students are judged by the teachers through one to one interaction. The teachers usually spend a few classes for recapitulation of the previous subject matters to bridge the gap, if any. Special orientation programme/Induction Meet is arranged before commencement of the regular classes.

## What are the strategies drawn and deployed by the institution to bridge the knowledge gap of the enrolled students to enable them to cope with the programme of their choice? (Bridge /Remedial/ Add on/ Enrichment Courses, etc).

Slow and advanced learners are identified on the basis of classroom participation, class tests, results of midterm examination and test. The teachers of different departments adopt strategies like academic counselling, remedial classes, special classes, tutorials for the slow learners so that they can cope with other students. Tutorial classes are structured within the master time table of departments. Majority of the students are from rural background, most of them lack computer skills. Identifying this skill gap, Hands-on-Training programme in Computer is arranged for all sections of the students at the commencement of each new session and has been made compulsory. Parent-teacher meetings are organized by all departments through which parents are intimated about the academic progress of their wards. They are encouraged to share their observations about their wards as well as the institution.

• **Remedial** -The College runs U.G.C. sponsored Remedial Course for students of the Minority and Backward classes. Special classes are held beyond college hours in various subjects to help the academically weak students.

• Add-on & Enrichment courses- The college has also started preparatory courses, entrepreneurship development and self- financing career-oriented courses. These are as follows:-

- 1. Preparatory courses for competitive examinations.
- 2. Entrepreneurship development courses in Art and Craft and workshop on Ornamental fishery.
- 3. Certificate Course in Computer Application and Information Technology
- 4. Certificate Course in Computer Application and Financial Accounting
- 5. Certificate Course in Communicative English.
- 6. Certificate Course in Dance.
- 7. Short term course on Interview facing skill and personality development


### How does the college sensitize its staff and students on issues such as gender, inclusion, environment etc.?

Students and staff are **sensitized on issues of gender** through holding seminars/invited lectures on gender-related topics. The various ways by which the institution sensitizes the issue of inclusion are the following:

- NSS units and NCC celebrates Women's Day by organizing debates, speech.
- Human Rights Department observes Human Rights Day on 10<sup>th</sup> December every year organising debate and eloquence on gender related issues like Dowry system, female foeticide, domestic violence, child trafficking and gender discrimination in collaboration with NGOs.
- Department of History also organises workshops on gender related issues.

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- The College caters exclusively to the educational needs of women. The institution undertakes research on gender issues, organizes seminars and various other programmes to discuss and deliberate on gender issues. The institution has an active Women's Cell.
- **Inclusive Representation** The institution is an inclusive one where there is no discrimination made on the basis of religion, caste, ethnicity, region, language, social status etc. Our hostel is an example of our endeavour to achieve the same. The College totally follows the 22% SC, 6% ST, and 17% OBC reservation. The institution has five students' hostels of which, one has been constructed with UGC assistance, to accommodate students from rural and tribal areas. A large number of tribal students and students from minority community stay in these hostels.
- The college admits SC/ST candidates with relaxed norms as per University rules. Certain concessions in fees in the form of granting full free studentship, half-free studentship are awarded to meritorious but needy students, who may be in indigent circumstances. There are some UGC scholarships for SC/ST/minority students.



• College has an Equal Opportunity Cell which organises workshop on Positive discrimination of women and backward sections of the community.

## **Regarding sensitization on the issue of environment** the institution has the following provisions:

• College takes special care in conducting the classes of Environmental Studies which is included as a compulsory subject carrying 50 marks in University B.A./B.Sc. syllabus.

- Besides this students and teachers actively participate in various activities like cleaning of the college campus, and different awareness programmes and observation of NO SMOKING DAY etc.
- Waste water management: The water coming out from washing etc. is collected and used for gardening.
- The institution is also fully aware of its responsibility to protect and preserve the environment and organizes the -Banomahotsav (festival of plantation of trees) annually to sensitize the students about the same.

- The work on installation of solar lamps in the College campus is in progress. It is being done with a view to create awareness on renewable energy sources among the staff and students.
- Fluorescent tube lights are gradually being replaced with LED lights to reduce pollution.
- Solar powered heaters have been installed in all the hostels for supply of hot water.
- College campus has been declared as a **no polythene zone and \_no tobacco zone**'.
- There is a Medicinal Garden sponsored by central govt. a Vermicompost unit, Rainwater Harvesting in the college pond and Kitchen garden which uses vermicompost are important features of the institution
- NSS observes the —World Environment Day II on 5<sup>th</sup> June and organises programmes to keep the campus, adjacent area and the adopted villages —lœan and green II.
- Wall Magazines on the contemporary topics are organised by different departments to address different environmental issues.

### How does the institution identify and respond to special educational/ learning needs of advanced learners?

- > The College has excellent laboratory facilities in the science subjects.
- Student projects are conducted for interested advanced learners.
- There is also a well-stocked library which houses 35656 books and subscribes to 35 journals and magazines.
- Each department has a supporting Seminar Library for average as well as advanced learners.
- > Internet access with Wi-Fi, student hotspots are available for students.
- The Post-graduate department as well as many under graduate departments has research scholars, so the advanced learners have a chance to interact with them and gain advanced knowledge
- Visits are regularly organized to research institutes and industries to address the needs of advanced learners.
- Several departments organize students' seminars, extension lectures, invited lectures by eminent scholars from other institutions etc.
- Advanced learners are encouraged to sit for competitive examinations like JAM and pursue higher studies and are motivated to participate actively in seminars in the college and in other academic institutions. The advanced learners also make use of the free internet and INFLIBNET facilities available in the college. They are also given special guidance by teachers. The teachers of the departments always identify and respond to special learning needs of advanced learners. They are motivated to refer advanced texts and journals which are available in College library. They are also encouraged to apply for different scholarships (viz. JBNSTS, INSPIRE, etc.). They are motivated to participate in seminar presentation, quiz competition, debates etc. in other colleges and institutes where they can excel themselves in the fields of their interest.

# How does the institute collect, analyze and use the data and information on the academic performance (through the programme duration) of the students at risk of drop out (students from the disadvantaged sections of society, physically challenged, slow learners, economically weaker sections etc.)?

• All relevant information of an applicant are collected through the admission form at the time of online submission of forms. These data on the admitted students are preserved in the college office. Besides this, at the time of admission to the college other important information on the students are preserved in the college office. Record of results of University examinations are preserved in the college office. In these ways the college maintains a students' profile. Departments use these data to study the academic progress of the students of the respective departments over time.

• Students' progressions are maintained in their departments. Although the rate of dropout students in this College is very low, special care is taken for slow learners and students from economically weaker sections so that they can gradually cope with the University Examination. Slow learners are identified and given remedial education. They are encouraged to keep individual contact with the teachers. Taking into the strength and weakness, the slow learners are given additional support whenever possible. The teachers take individual care to remove their difficulties in understanding the subject matters. A number of ways are adopted for their support both financially and socially keeping in mind that education for women is very important in our

country. Providing scholarship from student aid fund, psychological counselling and motivating sessions and mentorship are important tools for reducing the dropout rate of students.

• Students from the Minority community avail stipends sponsored by Minority Affairs Department of the Govt. of West Bengal.

• Kanyashree Scholarships offered by the State Government to the deserving girl students have been introduced from the last academic year. College has established a Scholarship Help Desk for giving information and assisting the students with regard to availing different scholarships awarded by government as well as private agencies.

• Free studentship (full/half) is extended to deserving candidates on the recommendation of the Departments.

• Scholarship help desk maintained by Career Advancement Centre assists students to obtain scholarships from different governmental and non governmental organisations like Merit cum Means scholarships, scholarships awarded by Jindal group, P. Birla Foundation, Sheela Kanoria foundation etc. by giving relevant information and helping the students in filling up the forms.

• Apart from this, expenditure incurred for field study is also provided to the needy students. The College also encourages its students through various prizes, some of which have been initiated several decades ago.

#### **Teaching-Learning Process**

## How does the college plan and organize the teaching, learning and evaluation schedules? (Academic calendar, teaching plan, evaluation blue print, etc.)

As our college is affiliated to Vidyasagar University it is bound to follow the academic schedule of the University. Individual departments have been given the liberty to have their own teaching plans. However, a detailed routine is sent to each department at the beginning of the session so that the departmental plans can be designed accordingly. Even the evaluation plans are provided by the University. These evaluations are in the form of Internal Assessments which are then decided by the academic subcommittee of the college and as Part I, II, III examinations which are directly conducted by the mother University.

A copy of master routine of the college has been given herewith which the college follows in structuring its activities in accordance with the University Calendar. **Annexure 6: College Routine (2015-16)** 

#### How does IQAC contribute to improve the teaching -learning process?

We have an active IQAC. It is concerned with all the activities of our college-from teaching to all extracurricular activities. IQAC conducts meeting from time to time to assess various activities that are being done by the departments in the said period of time. In such meetings we are all reminded about the various suggestions and recommendations made by the NAAC team during their last visit so that we can execute our forthcoming plans accordingly and try to meet the recommendations.

Some of the recommendations that have been implemented by the IQAC are-

- Museum in local art and culture has been initiated by the Department of Bengali. Digital language laboratory has been initiated by the Department of English.
- Use of ICT in teaching- Seventeen smart classes has been developed. Eleven more LCD/LED projectors have been procured and are now being used in classrooms and laboratories.

- All efforts to avail Student scholarship have been increased. Mentorship is being strengthened. Dropout rate is still below 2%.
- E-learning and networking centre has been initiated in the central library with the funding from DST-FIST.
- We have completed the 1<sup>st</sup> floor of the Library building and first floor of the Nutrition building- a total of Nine classrooms have been increased.
- Repair of students' furniture and electrical installations in General class rooms have been undertaken.
- Up-gradation of eight science laboratories in the department of Zoology, Botany, Physiology, Microbiology, Physics, Chemistry, Mathematics and Geography from BSR fund has been completed.
- Construction of new laboratories from college fund is done regularly..
- One week Workshop for teaching staff members on use of modern tools in teaching has been organized from 16<sup>th</sup> to 21<sup>st</sup> February, 2014.

## How is learning made more student-centric? Give details on the support structures and systems available for teachers to develop skills like interactive learning, collaborative learning and independent learning among the students?

Traditionally, Raja N. L. Khan Women's College is a rural based college where maximum girls come from the nearby villages. They do need a lot of support and care to equip themselves to run with the digital world around.

Hence we try to provide all such facilities that are required to make our students equipped to face the world. Students are made aware of the college and the future avenues of their respective subjects during the first departmental interaction and in the induction meeting. We have provided the students with an enriched library with a lot of books and journals where our students can furnish their knowledge. We have an E- Learning laboratory in our college where students can access internet for studies. We have an E-cell which trains the students in certain skills such as handicrafts, soft toy making, etc. that can later prove to be a support system for them and their family.

An HEPSN Centre is run under the college where differently-abled students are informed about various fellowships that they can avail. Different equipments are provided which help them to move easily within the campus. Further a computer loaded with a soft ware of Audio-Visual aid for the visually challenged students is also present in the campus. Ramps have been constructed in all the classroom buildings of the campus for better access of physically challenged students. Smt. Behula Maji, a non-teaching staff member is assigned with the duty of assisting PWD students if needed.

Spoken English and Computer classes have been made mandatory for all the students of our college.

The campus is fully Wi-Fi enabled so that students have access, via the University portal, to a universe of learning resources from all over the world. In addition to this: (a) the college library has its own dedicated portal through which also students and faculty members can access a lot of material. (b) the college has a computer centre with internet in CAC which is made good use of by students. Faculty members too have access to this. In their case, they have a dedicated room with computers in the library itself where they can work undisturbed for as long as they wish to.

#### Teachers are given all possible support for

**Interactive learning:** classrooms are provided with ICT facility, sound systems for better communication, seminar library is well equipped for reference work of the teachers. Teachers are given support and encouragement for holding workshops and seminars, quiz, group discussion, use of CD library is done in some departments. An unique method when students become teacher

is used on specific days in all the departments to make learning process interesting and participatory.

**Collaborative learning:** Through conducting project works, group discussion, educational excursion, movie club collaborative learning is encouraged.

**Independent learning:** Teachers encourage the students to access internet, the entire campus is under Wi-Fi and computers are provided to every department and faculties can also access the central computer facility and e learning centre. Faculties are given all possible support to attend seminar and workshop and encouraged to guide students for project work. Students are encouraged to participate in various co-curricular activities and involved in various outreach programme. Sometimes students' seminar presentations are carried out to make the teaching more interactive.

## How does the institution nurture critical thinking, creativity and scientific temper among the students to transform them into life-long learners and innovators?

Emphasis on promoting original and critical thinking is in the tradition and culture of Raja N. L. Khan Women's College. Students are listened to with respect and appreciation. Their views on teaching

learning process and other aspects are valued. We have Student's Feedback as well as Parent's Feedback meetings. The names of the students are kept concealed in the feedback reports which they give.

Their creativity is given wings by organizing various Cultural Competitions which includes Dance, Singing, Elocution, Debate, quiz etc.

Students are encouraged to publish their writings in the college magazine-Sanhita and share their creative works in the wall magazine. It is our conviction that, once they get the taste for ideas they will remain learners for the rest of their lives.

Every year the college organizes Foundation Day Ceremony where the students are given opportunity to display their talents before the public. Teachers also encourage and train the students to participate in various departmental programmes arranged throughout the year.

Students participate in inter university and state level cultural competitions and college takes care of their preparation, journey and other arrangements. Cultural subcommittee spots young talents and nurture with internal and external experts. Courses in Art and Craft-Card making, soft toy making are conducted to nourish and nurture the creativity of the students by Career Advancement Centre.

More attempts have been made towards cultivating critical and free thinking, creativity and scientific temper in them by providing hours in the weekly routines for Games, Seminars and Hobbies.

Seminars, workshops and various science related debates, quiz competitions are organized to promote scientific temper among students from DBT STAR scheme.

What are the technologies and facilities available and used by the faculty for effective teaching? Eg: Virtual laboratories, e-learning - resources from National Programme on Technology Enhanced Learning (NPTE) and National Mission on Education through Information and Communication Technology (NME-ICT), open educational resources, mobile education, etc.

- A well equipped central library and seminar library in each honours department is present in our college.
- > We have OHP and LCD Projector-enabled classrooms with sound systems
- > There are nearly 14 Smart Classrooms.
- Language laboratory and e learning facility is available.
- > Internet with Wi-Fi is available in the entire campus.
- Hotspots have been created for students.
- Mathematical Gallery, History Museum, Zoological Museum, Medicinal Plant garden has been set up in the college.
- Audio visual facilities are available for the VH students and other facilities like ramps, lifts, wheel chairs etc are there for other differently abled students.

## How are the students and faculty exposed to advanced level of knowledge and skills (blended learning, expert lectures, seminars, workshops etc.)?

- Various departments organize conferences, seminars and workshops from the UGC-CPE, DBT and other UGC funds in different intervals of each year.
- College library is upgraded with advanced books, journals and magazines. E resources are also added regularly.
- Departmental libraries are upgraded with books for reference work of teachers.
- Teachers are encouraged to attend RC/OP and seminars for upgrading themselves.
- Research committee encourages and plays an active role for procuring research projects by the teachers for their advancement.
- Special lecture are organized for teacher up-gradation. Student-teacher interactions within the classrooms has been enhanced by introducing the Tutorial and Problem solving classes every Saturday which mainly focuses on topics and themes beyond the syllabi.

Detail (process and the number of students benefitted) on the academic, personal and psycho-social support and guidance services (professional counselling/mentoring/academic advise) provided to students?

Academic and personal counselling-All the Honours Departments have a rich Seminar library. While encouraging and helping the students to make effective use of the library, the Faculty members provide the students with academic guidance and counselling. Classroom teaching is supplemented and augmented also by encouraging and helping the students to prepare papers for seminar presentations. Students are also counseled and informed about different avenues of higher studies available. Personal and psychosocial support and guidance is provided to the students through mentoring

Psychosocial counseling- Advisor and members of Equal Opportunity cell, coordinator of Remedial coaching provide counseling for students belonging to backward sections of the society, slow learners and students having other psychological problems. We have a professional counsellor who visits our college and college hostels to interact with the students. Girls freely discuss their feelings with the counsellor and are seem to be benefitted by her advices. Other than this we organize workshop on Stress management for our employees.

Guidance for various competitive examinations, preparatory courses and career counseling is done by Career Advancement Centre (Counselling, Training and Placement Cell) and also under the scheme of Entry in Services beyond college hours and on holidays including Sundays.

Provide details of innovative teaching approaches/methods adopted by the faculty during the last four years? What are the efforts made by the institution to encourage the faulty to adopt new and innovative approaches and the impact of such innovative practices on student learning?

In addition to the conventional teaching methodology and lecture mode there is an efficient tutorial system in our college that facilitates the individual teachers to adopt and adapt new modes and methods which they can implement without affecting the curricular structure designed by the university.

- Field trip and excursion are organized regularly.
  - Gurukul in the Department of Sanskrit, Mathematical gallery, Historical Museum, Museum on Art and Culture in the Departmental of Bengali create a different and unique learning environment. Medicinal Plant Garden, Botanical and Zoological museums are used in making teaching process interesting for the students and makes teaching learning an interactive process.
- Sensitizing the faculty about new technologies and methods in the academic subcommittee, teachers Council and IQAC.
- Sanctioning requisitions of equipments of various departments at the finance committee and thus making provisions for infrastructure for the use of new technology.
- By sending teachers and staff to various programmes and courses.
- The new modes and methods include the use of smart classes, projectors, audio visual aids and the internet.

#### How are library resources used to augment the teaching- learning process?

We have a well equipped Central Library with an ocean of books and journals. The internet facility, facilities of photocopy and the reading room provision is an added feather to the crown. Well equipped seminar libraries in every department are also very helpful for the students to augment the teaching learning process. Educational video shows are organized in the Central Library on a regular basis to attract students and make learning interesting.

## Does the institution face any challenges in completing the curriculum within the planned time frame and calendar? If \_yes', elaborate on the challenges encountered and the institutional approaches to overcome these.

The college has an exemplary work culture and therefore it seldom faces any challenge in completing the curriculum within the planned timeframe and calendar. Every individual faculty member are provided with a register where the details of their day to day classes are recorded. Other than these departmental meetings are held at fixed intervals to assess the progress of each teacher with the allotted syllabus. In individual cases where a teacher has to go on a long leave on account of personal and academic needs, extra classes are taken on holidays or in shifts to overcome the problem. To adjust the load of practical classes college stars practical classes from Part I itself, though not included in Part I syllabus of the university, so that there is enough time for the students to adopt to new practical methodologies in part II.

#### How does the institute monitor and evaluate the quality of teaching learning?

The quality of Teaching Learning is monitored through the feedback system (Both Parent and Students Feedback is taken either through the interactions in the meetings or in writing).

- Grievance Redressal Cell addresses issues related to teaching learning.


#### **Teacher Quality**

The institution abides by the methodology laid down by the UGC regarding the faculty selection process. The faculty members are appointed in our college from among the empanelled candidate in the West Bengal College Service Commission. The number of sanctioned teaching post in our college is 59. But presently we have 39 permanent teachers, 46 permanent part time (PTT) and contractual teachers (CWTT) approved by the state government are at work in the institution. In order to compensate this lack, we have appointed 44 guest teachers this year.

How does the institution cope with the growing demand/ scarcity of qualified senior faculty to teach new programmes/ modern areas (emerging areas) of study being introduced (Biotechnology, IT, Bioinformatics etc.)? Provide details on the efforts made by the institution in this direction and the outcome during the last three years.

For the professional, self financed course, batch of core teachers are available to handle major portions of the curricula while the rest are taught by guest faculty and faculties from other inter disciplinary department. No course of study is allowed to be affected due to shortage of faculty. With an aim to making the students up-to-date with recent development in the modern fields of studies we occasionally organize lectures, delivered by visiting professor from Vidyasagar University, Kalyani University, Biswabharati University and IIT-Kharagpur. To cope with the increasing number of vacant positions of teachers, the college also engages qualified guest teachers from time.



#### Self Study Report-2016 Has the institution introduced evaluation of teachers by the students and external Peers? If yes, how is the evaluation used for improving the quality of the teaching-learning process?

Evaluation of teachers has been done by the 3rd Year students since 2006 after their final internal assessment is over, where they can freely assess the performance of teachers of respective departments collectively. The feedback is analyzed by the principal and communicated to the teachers while handing over the feedback forms for introspection and improving teaching process. Statistical analysis of the feedback-results is made and status of individual teacher is scrutinized and corresponded to the concern faculty.

#### EVALUATION PROCESS AND REFORMS

## How does the institution ensure that the stakeholders of the institution especially students and faculty are aware of the evaluation processes?

In order to make the students as well as the faculty members of the institution completely aware of every minute detail of the evaluation process, the Academic sub-committee of our institution publishes a notice with all guidelines regarding the commencement of the Internal Assessments at least one month before the examination. A centralized scheduling is done by the Academic sub-committee. Routine and Syllabus of the evaluations are also displayed in the notice boards of each department (to maintain transparency in the method of evaluation).

Again as the Internal Assessment is over, the assessed answer scripts are shown to the students so that they come to know their strengths and their weaknesses and thus they get ample scope to rectify their mistakes and develop their skills prior to their University Examination. We also arrange a Parents'- Teachers' Meeting every year in order to monitor over the progress of every individual student in particular. Mentors also keep a strong watch on the progress of the students. Many departments also arrange 100 marks Preparatory Tests apart from the scheduled Internal Assessments. In this way the students are made prepared for their final exam.

#### What are the major evaluation reforms of the university that the university has adopted and what are the reforms initiated by the institution on its own?

To provide the learners ample opportunities of self-rectification and to reduce the panic of examination, Vidyasagar University has introduced the three-tier examination system w.e.f. 2006. The system incorporates in it two methods of evaluation – University Examination at the end of each session and Internal Assessments throughout the session. From the session 2014-2015, our University has brought a noticeable change in the pattern of Internal Assessments. At present two Internal Assessments carrying 10 marks each on each Honours paper and one Internal Assessment on each General paper of all courses are to be held/taken in every session. The marks scored by the students are included in the final result of the students.

As an affiliated college our institute does not enjoy the autonomy to formulate any major evaluation reform on its own. However to supplement the existing system of evaluation Other than the scheduled internal examinations framed by the university, class tests and tutorial evaluations are conducted in different departments. Slow learners are given special attention.

#### Self Study Report-2016 Raja Narendralal Khan Women's College How does the institution ensure effective implementation of the evaluation reforms of the university and those initiated by the institution on its own?

As the college is affiliated to Vidyasagar University, it follows the rules and regulations set by the University. The information regarding evaluation reforms is stated in the University Academic Calendar. On the commencement of every academic session, this calendar is circulated to the college by university. The academic calendar is then circulated to every department by the college authority. The students and teachers thus get aware of the evaluation reforms. Our Academic Sub-Committee prepares a schedule of the evaluation process according to the university academic calendar. This process is maintained strictly throughout the college. So, the institution keeps a transparency thorough the whole evaluation process. At the institutional level student attendance and punctuality in attending classes are monitored at monthly basis. Based on which the students are allowed to appear for internal examinations.

Provide details on the formative and summative assessment approaches adopted to measure student achievement. Cite a few examples which have positively impact on the system.

The formative and summative assessment approaches that are adopted by the institution to measure student achievement are -

**Formative assessment** of students are made by the teachers on a daily basis as a part of the teaching method by asking questions to determine how much the students have learned and how much they shall have to learn a given topic. Internal Assessments (10 marks in each theoretical paper) also assess the learning stages of the students identifying the slow learners before the final examination. Group discussions and student seminars also play an important part in formative assessment of the students.

**Summative evaluation:** The students are evaluated at the end of every academic session by the University. The examination pattern is as follows:

Part-I: 2 Honours papers of 100 mark each + 1 General paper of 100 marks, For general stream: 3 general papers of 100 each.

Part-II: 3 Honours papers of 100 marks each + 2 General papers of 100 marks; For general stream: 6 general papers of 100 each (one Practical paper of 100 marks for science stream).

Part-III: 3 Honours papers of 100 marks each + ENVS paper of 50 marks + 2 Compulsory language papers of 50 marks each. For general stream: 3 general papers of 100 each.

The result of a student is considered holistically at the end of Part-III examination.

**Details on the significant improvements made in ensuring rigor and transparency in the internal assessment and weightages assigned for the overall development of the students.** (Weigthages for behavioural aspects, independent learning, communication skills etc.) The graded process of examinations already firmly in place ensures rigor and transparency.

- The monitoring of the student attendance and debarring the irregular students from appearing in internal assessments has made a positive impact.
- The College has in place a very thorough invigilation mechanism.
- UG and PG level scripts are assessed by several teachers ruling out any possibility of

under/ over marking.

- The evaluated scripts are shown to the students to make them aware about their shortcomings.
- PG department has in place a system of evaluation by external examiners ensuring rigor and transparency in assessment.
- Additionally the Academic Committee plays a very constructive role to ensure complete integrity in the process.
- College has to abide by the evaluation system framed by the university and has no scope for giving weightage in the evaluation process for behavioral aspects or communication skills.

#### Self Study Report-2016 Raja Narendralal Khan Women's College What is the graduate attributes specified by the college /affiliating university? How does the college ensure the attainment of these by the students?

Vidyasagar University, Midnapore has specified that a student has to obtain minimum of 40% marks in his/her Honours subject at the end of the course in order to be a Honours Graduate and at least 30% of marks in order to be a Pass Graduate. Failing to obtain the pass marks, the student has to reappear in the same examination. The university norms for eligibility of students to appear in the final examinations are also based on the attendance of the students. The college on its own have specified certain attributes for its students, such as regularity and punctuality, discipline in the college campus and participation in the different co curricular activities to determine the overall progression of the students.

The Internal Quality Assessment Committee (IQAC) plays a crucial role to ensure the attainment of the graduate attributes by the students:

- The progress of a student is monitored through class tests, home assignment and seminars.
- As mentioned above regularity and punctuality is ensured by student attendance and penalizing those who are found to be habitually irregular in attending classes. The college provides incentives to the students in a department securing highest marks in their previous examination. Moreover each department felicitates their best student in the college Foundation Day.
- It has upgraded the MIS system of smart college software for keeping a database information about the students.
- It has established photocopier for students to make photocopy of their documents.
- It has established language laboratory to improve the skills of communicative English.

## What are the mechanisms for redressal of grievances with reference to evaluation both at the college and university level

- Our college has already formed a Grievance Redressal Cell. If at any point of time during the course a student finds herself not happy with the evaluation of her answer script, she is free to relate all her grievances to the Head of the concerned department. Now if the accusation is found justified by the Head of the Department, then he/she informs the concerned teacher. Again if the complaint is against the Head of the Department, then it can be forwarded to the Grievance Redressal Cell which takes the necessary steps immediately. Complaint Box for students are placed at different places in the college campus.
- The college is affiliated to Vidyasagar University, Midnapore, it follows the rules and regulations set by the University. In case the grievance is against the evaluation of answer scripts of University Examination, the photocopy of the answer-script is issued to the student on demand under R.T.I Act through the college.
- Re-examination of answer-script is also done on demand of students through the college.

The College has always focused on the nurturing and development to a complete woman. Students are provided with the opportunities required to identify and develop their inherent qualities to help them flourish as complete human beings and take on the role of responsible and sensitive global citizens. Emphasis is laid on the historical and cultural heritage of India, nurturing such values in education that can inculcate a sense of patriotism among the students and bring them up as conscious and self-reliant citizens of the country. The college has clearly declared its mission in its prospectus as well as in college web site. Students are encouraged to participate in different cultural competitions and sports events both in college and university level. Students are also motivated to enhance their extracurricular activities, such as academic debate, extempore, quiz etc. Special awareness programmes on gender sensitivity is carried out.

Enumerate on how the institution monitors and communicates the progress and performance of students through the duration of the course/programme? Provide an analysis of the students' results/achievements (Programme/course wise for last four years) and explain the differences if any and patterns of achievement across the programmes/courses offered.

All the departments maintain a register book to record the annual as well as internal assessment progress of the students. After each internal examination, results are displayed on the departmental notice boards and university examination results are published in the annual report of the college. Teachers discuss with the students their performance and the way to improve further. On the occasion of Foundation Day, Principal announces students' performance and learning outcomes to motivate the present students. Special prizes are given to the students for their excellent performance which inspire the running students. In Academic Sub-Committee meetings, systematic analysis of the students' performances is discussed in regular basis for further improvement.






Graph 2.6.1: Pass Percentage in different subjects in 2011




Graph 2.6.2: Analysis of result pattern (2011)




Graph 2.6.3: Pass Percentage in different subjects in 2012



Graph 2.6.4: Analysis of Result (2012)




Graph 2.6.5: Pass Percentage in different subjects in 2013




Graph 2.6.6: Analysis of Result (2013)

Graph 2.6.7: Pass Percentage in different subjects in 2014





Graph 2.6.8: Analysis of Result (2014)



# How are the teaching learning and assessment strategies of the institution structured to facilitate the achievement of the intended learning outcomes?

The Institution promotes learning through seminars, project works and practical sessions. The Institution encourages field visits, educational excursions promotes consciousness on conservation of nature and social issues. Students and staff are made aware of these through academic calendar, classroom teaching, interactive sessions, parent-meet and through programmes like the Foundation Day function, Alumnae meet programmes. Assessment strategies are structured by the Academic Sub-Committee following the Vidyasagar University Academic-Calendar. Remedial coaching is run by the concerned teachers of each department in the college especially for the SC, ST and Minority students. Various departments organize special lectures on relevant topics by bringing eminent scholars from other premier institute like IIT, Kharagpur, ISI, Kolkata, Institute of Development Studies Kolkata etc. to give better exposure to the students. Classes are taken with modern computer aided teaching appliances.

Mandatory computer training and spoken English classes are organized to equip our students with employability skills. Co-curricular group activities like NSS, NCC and cultural programmes foster self-development, community service, national integration and accountability towards the society in general.

What are the measures/initiatives taken up by the institution to enhance the social and economic relevance (student placements, entrepreneurship, innovation and research aptitude developed among students etc.) of the courses offered?

The college has a Training, Counselling and placement cell, of Career Advancement Cell (CAC), which is involved in conduction of preparatory programmes for competitive examinations on holidays and beyond college hours, student counseling, student placements, entrepreneurship development in soft toy, art and craft, ornamental fishery. All science departments and different Arts departments like Geography, Economics, Bengali, Human rights etc carried on dissertation programmes to enhance research aptitudes among the students. 






Plate 3.6.1: Conducting Inspire Camp in our college for school children- A community link is developed

The students participate in various philanthropic activities organized by the NSS wing of the College. Their involvement in blood donation, Thalassemia camps, contribution in village areas, paying homage to Bengal luminaries, observance of Human Rights Day, No Tobacco Day, World AIDS day ensure the promotion towards the augmented citizenship role. They are also actively involved in the cultural programmes held during the year. Under the supervision of their teachers, our students are engaged in preserving the lush green environment of the College campus. For maintaining the garden of the College, NSS units and NCC put up posters for general awareness about the environment and as a whole keep the College clean and green and also for minimizing electrical consumption. The College thus inculcates the ideal of good citizenship in the minds of the students ensuring their active involvement in different aspects of the society.

Adequate infrastructure facilities are key instruments for effective and efficient teaching learning for any educational programmes. Thus our institution emphasizes on rapid growth on infrastructure with the academic developments of the institution. The other supportive facilities on the campus are t h e development of effective ambience for curricular, extracurricular and administrative activities. The policy of the Institution is to offer such infrastructure that facilitates excellence in educational perspective and dimension.

### Details of the facilities available for

### a) Curricular and Co Curricular activities:

The infrastructural facilities for curricular and cocurricular activities are as follows- **Administrative building-** The Gope Palace, a separate administrative building, functions as the administrative section. The building is recognized as a Heritage Building by West Bengal Heritage Commission.

**Classrooms** – Three separate blocks, Arts block, Bio Science block and Pure Science block avail a total of 22 classrooms for teaching learning process.

**Smart classrooms**- Our College has a total of seventeen smart classes for different departments. **Laboratories**- A total of twenty two well equipped laboratories with modern equipments and facilities as pr the requirements of the syllabus are available in the institution.

**Central Library-**Total area 656 sq mts having 35,656 books and subscribes to 35 journals and magazines.

**Seminar Library:** All the Honours departments and the Department of Physical Education have a seminar library with a total of 7,821 books.

E learning Laboratory- Equipped with 15 computers and other ICT tools.

Central Computer Centre-25 computers are available, open on all days.

**Medicinal Plant Garden:** One Medicinal Plant Garden has been developed with the help of financial assistance of the Medicinal Board, Govt. of WB.

Animal House- A separate House constructed and maintained as per the norms of UGC for Bio Science Departments.

**Seminar Hall - Rabindraneer** with A/V aids and sound system is available for conducting seminar and other academic programme.

### b) Extra Curricular Activities:

**Sports**- Different sports infrastructure, namely, Basket ball court, Volley ball court, Kho- Kho Court is available. Provision of indoor Games facilities and Gymnasium are also available. **Auditorium** – Seating capacity of 2000.

**Regular NCC training and NSS activities** –nAactive NCC unit having 175 cadets under an ANO and three NSS units having 300 volunteers are functioning in the college.

**Cultural Activities** – Cultural programmes and competitions are organized every year by the cultural subcommittee and also by the departments on a regular basis. Students participate in both in house and inter college activities. Intra and inter college cultural/yoga competition are held on a regular basis.

**Other Activities**-Health and Hygiene Camps for students and nearby adopted villages are also conducted on a regular basis







The faculty and students of the college enjoy Computer and internet facility within the campus with the help of the Departmental Computers, Computer laboratories maintained by each individual Department prior to the implementation of making the college campus a "Wi-Fi Zone". Wi-Fi facility has been made available in the college campus. The Central Computer Facility in Career Advancement Centre has also been upgraded. Apart from this one e-learning Laboratory has been set up which helps the Staff to have their account for online access through INFLIBNET. The library also extends computers and internet facility and bibliographic databases through OPAC. A mandatory short term computer course has also been introduced for each student of this institution. As per the norms of the university, the college has also introduced the online admission process and the off-campus students (applicants) also use the internet/computer facilities for submission their admission form.

### What are the institutional plans and strategies for deploying and upgrading the IT infrastructure and associated facilities?

With increase in student-strength and inclusion of computer application in curriculum of different subjects, the need for more computers has been ever-increasing. The requirement is assessed on yearly basis and arrangement is made for new procurement. Rapid development in IT sector also leads to compatibility issues regarding new software and up-gradation remains a continuous process at definite intervals.




Fig. 4.3.1. Expenditure details for expenses - Chemicals, Transport of students, Building and other expenses

### How does the institution facilitate extensive use of ICT resources including development and use of computer-aided teaching/ learning materials by its staff and students?

Many teachers take help of the ICT resources to enrich their prescribed curriculum with the help of internet. Faculty members are provided computers with internet browsing facility for preparation of teaching/learning materials in their respective departments. Also, multimedia projectors are available within the college for the faculty use. The college has seventeen ICT based smart class rooms. The college has a language laboratory (English), Central Computer Centre and e-Learning Lab with all ICT facilities. The college also has a Conference hall -Rabindra Neer for the use of demonstration of models or conduct seminar/conference on advanced topics. Interesting multimedia/video shows are organized in the college.

# Elaborate giving suitable examples on how the learning activities and technologies deployed (access to on-line teaching - learning resources, independent learning, ICT enabled classrooms/learning spaces etc.) by the institution place the student at the centre of teaching-learning process and render the role of a facilitator for the teacher.

• Parallel to the traditional method of teaching with ink and white board, audio visual modes of teaching are being adopted by most of the departments. There are seventeen ICT based classrooms. There are 22 LCD projectors that are used on a regular basis.

• To enrich the learning experience of the student computer aided teaching/learning materials are being encouraged. Internet connection in the computer laboratory and all the departmental computers help the faculty to browse and download study materials. PowerPoint presentation by faculty improves the quality of the classroom lectures and influences students towards academic and research. Students of several departments, namely, PG-Zoology, Economics, Nutrition, Computer Science and BCA, use the departmental computer lab for the preparation of their project work and students seminar.

• The curriculum of some departments makes extensive & compulsory use of computer applications and some specific software.

• The website of the college provides all relevant information. This becomes very helpful for outstation students especially during admission procedure. The college is adopting online admission from 2015-2016 sessions.

• With a view to maintaining transparency and effective governance management adopts the application of IT at different academic and administrative levels.

### Does the Institution avail of the National Knowledge Network connectivity directly or through the affiliating university? If so, what are the services availed of?

The college has not availed connectivity through National Knowledge Network. However, the College is a subscriber of the INFLIBNET facility of UGC.

Optimal use of Computer Centre and network facility is done by the college by conducting various courses other than the scheduled classes of undergraduate courses. From 2006 onwards Certificate courses on computer application are being conducted for its students. From the academic session 2015-2016, the college has introduced a Mandatory Computer Course' entitled *"Hands on Computer"* to endow all students with basic knowledge in computer operating for all

the students irrespective of stream and courses, considering the necessity of basic operating knowledge in computer for all the students to face competition in the job market. The proposed course is of 9 hours duration comprising of Theoretical and practical classes of 8 hours and examination of 1 hour and the same is offered to the students in different batches beyond college hours. Certificates have been issued in favour of the students accordingly.

The faculty members of the Computer Science Department, BCA Department have been entrusted with the necessary teaching work in this regard apart from their normal Departmental loads as the classes are arranged by the Career Advancement Centre of the College beyond normal class hours.

The College also offers optional courses in computer operation, entitled "Certificate Course in Computer Application and Information Technology" and "Certificate Course in Computer Application and Financial Accounting" both of one year duration. Both these two courses attract a good number of students every year. The classrooms are also utilized for conducting various preparatory courses on Sundays and holidays ensuring optimal utilisation.

### **Maintenance of Campus Facilities**

How does the institution ensure optimal allocation and utilization of the available financial resources for maintenance and upkeep of the following facilities (substantiate your statements by providing details of budget allocated during last four years)?

Annual budget is designed by the bursar based on the requirements placed by different department and other sections of the college like office, library, hostel etc. The Finance Committee and the Purchase Committee oversees the utilization of available allocation of budget. The realization of anticipated income/ received fund as well as actual expenditure is carefully monitored by the bursar and the Finance Committee.

Departments and other sections of the college which include office, hostel, library etc. prepare a requirement list for allocation of fund before the preparation of annual budget for consideration of the bursar, convener of the Finance Committee and accountant who are in charge of the preparation of annual budget. Again as and when requirement arises, a list of requirements is places before the Finance Committee by departments/sections of the college for necessary verification and analysis. On site/departmental visits are done before approval and the requirements are then forwarded to the purchase committee. All decisions taken in the said two committees are forwarded to the governing body for final approval.

### What are the institutional mechanisms for maintenance and upkeep of the infrastructure, facilities and equipment of the college?

Departments and sections submit a requirement list for up-keeping of their facilities and equipments from time to time. Requirements of all departments and activities of the college is presented to the Finance Committee. The committee scrutinizes the budget and gives an approval after satisfactory explanations. Purchase Committee approves the appointment of Engineers and technicians and engages private agencies on annual contract for maintenance of equipments.

- The college has fulltime electrical technicians and two part time electricians for maintenance of electrical installations.
- Computers and printers in the campus are maintained through AMC (Eastern Datatech Private Ltd.).
- Maintenance of 03 Generators (120 KVA each) is done through AMC (Kirloskar).

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- Campus upkeep (cleaning of campus including parking areas, toilets and bathrooms) is maintained by two fulltime sweepers and 04 cleaners are appointed on contractual basis.
- Campus security is outsourced to a security agency (Trishakti Security Pvt. Ltd)
- Garden Maintenance is outsourced to M/S Arobindo Maity.

### How and with what frequency does the institute take up calibration and other precision measures for the equipment/instruments?

All the instruments/equipments in the laboratories are well maintained and standard operation procedures are followed whenever used. Regular maintenance of instruments is also done through departmental funding as well as funding from external funding agencies.

For minor instruments like pH meter, conductivity meter etc., calibrations are done every day, just before using the instrument.

For high end instruments like HPLC (High Performance Liquid Chromatography) and UV Spectrophotometer(s), the method used for calibration varies according to the instrument.

### What are the major steps taken for location, upkeep and maintenance of sensitive equipment (voltage fluctuations, constant supply of water etc.)?

Main Circuit Breaker (MCB) and Earth Leakage Circuit Breaker (ELCB) is placed at prominent power supply units. Electrical earthing is done properly. Regular maintenance work for wiring and electrical installation is done by a permanent electrical staff and two part-time staff members. External agencies are also engaged in case of major repair/maintenance work is required after estimation by a qualified electrical engineer.

The college has its own pumping station with pumps operated by PHE. The college has main water storage tank of forty five thousand gallon capacity. In addition to this, there are twelve storage tanks and for water storage and constant supply.

College make focused efforts towards upgrading and maintaining the infrastructure of the campus. Various proposals in this regard have been submitted to different agencies and many proposals have been sanctioned by BDO, Midnapore Sadar for inclusion of our college in 100 days employment generation programme (NREGA) for campus cleaning and maintenance, Paschimanchal Unanyan parshad for roads inside the campus and by higher education for maintenance of buildings

In addition the Academic Calendar is made available to the students to stay updated to the yearlong schedule of the institution.

The Institution ensures its accountability through strong and active outreach programs conducted by the college N.S.S Units (winner of \_Best N.S.S Unit Award, 2014<sup>•</sup>). Through various activities of N.S.S the College organizes various outreach programs such as adoption of village areas, cleaning of College surroundings, organizing various awareness programs and health camps.

Raja N.L. Khan Women's College shows its commitment towards its students and the society by maintaining a high standard of education at U.G and P.G levels, as well as various research works being pursued under different departments. The College equally stresses on social works through its various Outreach programs to serve the lower strata of the society. The College is accountable for its administrative works to the Department of Higher Education under Government of West Bengal and The Vidyasagar University for its academic works.

• The College makes an effort at organizing activities such as Inter College Competitions in various categories like Singing, Dancing, Painting, etc. throughout the academic year.

• The College has an efficient Cultural Committee to Organize Co-Curricular activities. 

#### Self Study Report-2016 Raja Narendralal Khan Women's College How does the institution facilitate student progression to higher level of education and/or towards employment?

The college takes numerous initiatives to inspire and motivate students to pursue higher education after their graduation / post-graduation. For instance, when the teachers orient their students in the first year classes, a broad outline of the scope of that subject and avenues that

are open for the students after their degree courses are discussed. Guest lectures by eminent academicians/ experts in the field are arranged by all the departments so that the students get a chance to interact with experts who have contributed very meaningfully to their discipline.

This can also serve as a guiding light for students to pursue higher education in their field.

For subjects like Physiology, Nutrition, Zoology, Microbiology, Computer Science and BCA the students do their project work/visit institutes/university departments/industries of repute which helps them to understand practical applications of their subject and helps them in progressing further.

Mentors try and identify students who are at risk of failure and special tutorial classes are arranged by some departments. All the honours departments provide remedial teaching to academically weaker students. Otherwise, students who are likely to drop out owing to financial problems are

given financial support from the Student Aid Fund of the college and are assisted to apply for different scholarship schemes through scholarship help desk. Counselling and guidance is provided to students who are depressed and/ or mentally weak/insecure or lacks confidence.

### How does the college seek and use data and feedback from its graduates and employers, to improve the performance and quality of the institutional provisions?

The college has a system whereby students give feedback on teaching and on general facilities on their 3<sup>rd</sup> year. Parent Feedback is also taken during parent meet and alumnae feedback is collected during departmental as well as central alumnae meet. This feedback is analysed by the Principal, convener of the Parent Committee, Convener of Academic Committee and Secretary-Alumnae Association. Concrete recommendations are placed in IQAC, Academic and Finance committee and forwarded o GB for implementation.

## How does the college involve and encourage students to publish materials like catalogues, wall magazines, college magazine, and other material? List the publications/ materials brought out by the students during the previous four academic sessions.

The college publishes a magazine called  $-Sanhita\parallel$ , which is a joint venture of teachers and students. Essays, articles with critical evaluations of various events, poems and paintings published in this magazine.

Many departments like Botany, Microbiology, Zoology, Physiology, Nutrition, English, Bengali, History also publish a wall magazine by the students every year.

### Does the college have a Student Council or any similar body? Give details on its selection, constitution, activities and funding.

The college has a –Student Union<sup>||</sup> for every Academic Year. The selection of –Student Union<sup>||</sup> is as per the statutory provisions of Vidyasagar University.

#### **Objectives of Student's Union**

- a) To bring unity among the students
- b) To promote academic, scientific, cultural and social outlook among the students
- c) To promote discipline, sense of responsibility and integrity among the students

d) To foster healthy and cultural relations with the teachers and non-teaching staff of the college

#### **Election procedure:**

Election of the union is held in accordance with the principle of simple majority voting system and through secret ballot. The elected members elect the office bearers in the first meeting presided over by the principal within 7 working days from the date of election. The election of the office bearers is also held in accordance with the principle of simple majority voting system and through secret ballot.

#### **Constitution of the Student's Union:**

The executive body of student's union consists of :

- 1) President
- 2) Vice-president
- 3) General Secretary

- 4) Assistant General Secretary
- 5) Secretaries of different sections(Sports, cultural, magazines, student welfare)
- 6) Class representatives from each class of each stream in the ratio of 25:1

#### **Funding:**

Fund is built with the amount of fees for student's union collected from the students. The union may, however, seek contribution from any other source for any specific purpose with the approval of the Principal of the college.

#### Activities of the office bearers:

President: to preside over all the meetings of the executive body of the student's union except the first meeting.

Vice-president: to preside over the meeting in the absence of the president

General Secretary: to carry out day to day functions of the union as the executive head of the union

Assistant GS: to assist the GS and to discharge the duties of GS in her absence Sectional Secretaries: to carry out the duties of their respective sections

Student representation and participation has been an integral part of academics as also of the various activities of the college. Student representation is on the following committees:

### How does the institution network and collaborate with the Alumni and former faculty of the Institution.

The college invites former faculty members and alumni for seminars and conferences organized by the college and they are felicitated on such special occasions. Some of the former faculty members /Principals are invited to deliver special sessions at teachers' training programme. Through such functions the present faculty members and students get an opportunity to interact with the alumni and former faculty of the institution. 22nd August is the Foundation Day of the college. On this day, all the alumni and parents are invited to visit the college and interact with the staff.

State the vision and mission of the Institution and enumerate on how the mission statement defines the institution's distinctive characteristics in terms of addressing the needs of the society, the students it seeks to serve, institution's traditions and value orientations, vision for the future, etc.?

Right from the foundation of Raja N. L. Khan Women's College in August 1957, its pivotal aim has been to empower the womanhood through a proper admixture of both pragmatic and mental developments. The students are time and again reminded of the speech given by Dr. B. C. Roy on 10<sup>th</sup> October 1961 in which he has said that the student of this college should enkindle their mental matrix with –an ideal of complete womanhood —Not only that but also the teachers , staff and others are keenly conscious of this noble mission. They are always doing their best in order to instill into the mind of the students the notion of womanhood which would flicker up the flame of feminism, there by reorganizing and reshaping their thinking structure.

Apart from general transmission and generation of knowledge through class room teaching, the objective of the college is to make the students self reliant and ideal human beings with the knowledge of modern science and ancient culture. This ambience is reflected in the courses offered to the students by providing modern sciences like Computer Sciences, BCA, Microbiology and Nutrition on one hand whereas Sanskrit, Philosophy and Music on the other hand. Besides NCC and NSS programmes in the college make the students conscious of their societal responsibilities at large. Research facilities available in the college also try to elevate it to an advanced center of learning. It is needless to say that the college emphasizes on expansion of women education in West Bengal and is being considered as a leading institution in the field of woman education in West Bengal. Presently the college imparts Post Graduate teaching in Zoology under Vidyasagar University and in the various streams of science and arts under the aegis of Netaji Subhas Open University. The Vision and mission of the college thus can be summarized as-

- Empowerment of women especially of the rural and backward area.
- Upliftment of socially and financially weaker section of the society through disbursement of knowledge.

### What is the role of top management, Principal and Faculty in design and implementation of its quality policy and plans?

The management follows the strong monitoring mechanism on the teaching learning process of the college ,i.e whether the departments are following their routine, teaching plan, whether the syllabus is completed on time and internal assessment are conducted properly are also monitored through the review made in the academic committee meetings. Information on infrastructural requirements, requirement of technical support for faculty and nonteaching staff have been collected from different committees like Teacher's Council. Academic Committee and IQAC for designing the route plan of the institution. Principal, TCS (Teacher's Council Secretary), IQAC Coordinator and internal GB members play an important role **in designing and implementing** quality policies and plans. Responsibilities of the staff members are carefully assigned in the meetings of Teacher's Council and different committees formed with

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teaching and non teaching staff members. The conveners of different committees convey meeting on a regular basis to decide the various matters pertaining to the committees. Proper notices are served and circulated so that all staff member are aware of different activities of the management. All these steps have been taken for effective implementation of the quality enhancement strategies

#### What is the involvement of the leadership in ensuring:

#### • the policy statements and action plans for fulfillment of the stated mission ?

Inspired by the Institutional mission, the Principal of the College maintains coordination with all stakeholders and the Governing Body, the IQAC and the Teachers' s Council in formulating the policy statements and action plans.

### formulation of action plans for all operations and incorporation of the same into the institutional strategic plan ?

The different sub committees are formed by the Teacher's Council and Governing Body which formulate the action plans and are in approved in the Governing Body .

#### Interaction with stakeholders

Interaction with stakeholders is a continuous process which involves dynamic exchanges between the parents and the teachers at the departmental level. The Principal also mediates at such meetings as and when necessary. Keeping the parents updated about their wards' progress is an essential component of the teaching learning process and this is taken care of at such meetings. Faculty members are also encouraged by the Principal to undertake Minor Research

Projects and faculty development programmes. The Teachers' Council is an important forum where issues related to academic matters and overall development of the College in general are taken up. TC meetings are presided over by the Principal point to visit the college when they directly interact the principal and teachers. The Principal and faculty members regularly interact with the students who are the most important stakeholders. The IQAC seeks their feedback and necessary steps are taken to address their concerns.

### • Proper support for policy and planning through need analysis, research inputs and consultations with the stakeholders

Need analysis is enabled by mutual interaction between various stakeholders. The presence of a Grievance Redressal Cell and Anti Ragging Cell and an Students' Union ensures an healthy atmosphere in the College. The evaluation forms filled up by the outgoing third year students also helps in assessing the needs of the students. The Principal intervenes at every level of such interaction between stakeholders whenever necessary.

#### • Reinforcing the culture of excellence

In order to reinforce the culture of excellence, the Principal, Governing Body and the faculty members with the cooperation of the Government have taken the following measures: The departments of Human Rights, History and Philosophy along with Women's cell, which renders its service to gender issues. Regular Workshops and Seminarsare conducted to make the students aware of the issues relating to women.

#### • Champion organizational change

The College runs a Career Counselling Cell which bridges the gap between the students seeking job and the reputed companies and organisations which can offer appropriate job opportunities.

The College has a Students' Union which takes care of the issues of the

students. Students' Union election is conducted every year. Representation for the posts is taken from the students of UG level of both the Science and Humanities departments and the first year students of the Post Graduate department.

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6.1.4. What are the procedures adopted by the institution to monitor and evaluate policies and plans of the institution for effective implementation and improvement from time to time?

The college has made consistent efforts towards enhancing the overall –Qualityll of academics and administration. For every academic program, an Academic audit of teachers is carried out during CAS and the report is sent to the Higher Education Department. Feedback is taken from parents, students and alumnae by the IQAC to evaluate various systems running in the college. For administration, web-based college administration system has been used right from student admissions to administration. Different committees of the college review and monitor the plans and policies and suggest necessary reforms. After proper assessment of the suggestions, the Governing Body take the final decisions.

#### Give details of the academic leadership provided to the faculty by the top management?

Principal gives freedom to the faculty members to develop academic leadership. The faculty is given the opportunity to act as conveners, coordinators or members of various committees and academic events organized by the college. Teachers can also work in various bodies of the university and other institutions.

The Heads of departments are given freedom to administer their respective departments, plan and execute academic programs. Post Graduate Programme Coordinator is appointed to facilitate smooth conduct of post graduate classes and other academic activities

#### How does the college groom leadership at various levels?

Responsibilities of the staff members are carefully distributed among them in the T.C meeting and in the governing Body meetings. Different committees are formed with teaching and non teaching staff members. Administrative and academic responsibilities are distributed to the conveners/coordinators for different committees to groom leadership at different levels.

The main points in this regard are-

- Involvement of all sections/members in the college activities of his / her interest.
- Circulation of the list of activities / committees amongst the faculty, staff and students.
- Assign responsibilities by providing freedom and necessary support for implementation.
- Appreciate the innovative ideas and leadership qualities shown by members.

## 6. 1.7 How does the college delegate authority and provide operational autonomy to the departments / units of the institution and work towards decentralized governance system?

The various departments of the College works under the leadership and supervision of their respective Heads/Coordinators/in charges who take individual decisions regarding syllabus distribution, routine and purchases of their departments after discussion in the departmental committee meetings. The different units like the NSS, NCC, NSOU study centre and Training, Counselling and Placement Cell enjoy operational autonomy to plan their activities.

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### 6.1.8 Does the college promote a culture of participative management? If \_yes', indicate the levels of participative management.

Yes, the college is committed to a culture of participative management. The Principal, Secretary-Teacher's Council, GB members and IQAC coordinator is responsible for academic and administrative leadership of the college. The Principal meets regularly with Heads of departments, conveners/coordinators of committees and internal GB members to discuss academic or administrative issues. The IQAC meets periodically to discuss the points related to the quality policy and plans. The IQAC also includes faculty members along with members from the society for the policy / plan formulation and its implementation. Faculty members from IQAC play an active role in the management of academic activities of the college. Students actively participate in various curricular, co-curricular and extra-curricular activities. Faculty members participate in the management process not only as members of the Governing body but also as members/coordinators/conveners of different committees. The provision of membership of students in different committees (namely Saraswati puja committee, Foundation day celebration committee, hostel committee) also helps to promote the participatory management system.

#### **Strategy Development and Deployment**

### Does the Institution have a formally stated quality policy? How is it developed, driven, deployed and reviewed?

Yes. The college has a distinct quality policy oriented towards achieving the goals and mission. The IQAC has revised and reviewed the quality policy through the involvement of stakeholders. The –Quality Policy of the college is driven by the teaching and non teaching staff of the college and also by our students. The deployment of –Quality Policy is channelized through:

- Taking a formal feedback on teaching-learning process of all the programmes.
- Encouragement and appreciation provided to the teachers for their contribution in college activities.
- Providing a platform of opportunities to enhance their competency levels.
- Addressing the issues related to recruitment of guest teachers, their workload and teaching plans for each academic semester.
- Providing special infrastructure in terms of learners' needs.
- Focusing on Societal outreach programme
- Focusing on overall development of students.
- The policies are reviewed in Academic committee, Teacher's council and Governing Body of the college.

### Does the Institute have a perspective plan for development? If so, give the aspects considered for inclusion in the plan.

Yes. The college has a perspective plan of development which is developed by the Governing Body. This plan is reviewed as per the needs of learners and in keeping with the higher education policies of the state and UGC. Some of the aspects are

• Growth in terms of academic programmes that focus on skill based education. e.g. Computer Application, Soft Skill Development, Art and Craft, Dance.

• Formalize -Procedures and Policies for development of research, infrastructure etc.,

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• Creation of internet facility with Wi-Fi hot spots in the campus. Promote extensive use of ICT in all academic and administrative transactions.

- Solar powered equipments.
- Awareness campaigns for waste management, energy audits and aligning our activities with social needs.

• Upgrading the physical infrastructure in terms of water resources, power supply and modifications/ repairs.

• Maintenance of laboratory working tables and storage facilities in the laboratories for students.

- Strengthening the Science laboratory through purchase of new equipments.
- Computerization of library services and digitization of very old manuscripts.

#### Describe the internal organizational structure and decision making processes.

The organizational structure of the college is based on Acts and Statutes which have their own demarcated area of jurisdiction. The Governing Body, as the highest policy making body, is at the top of the structure, representing different cross-section of population and provides overall guidance/supervision and deliberate frame work. In Academic matters, the Teachers Council virtual autonomy considering the suggesstions and recommendations of the various sub-committees . The Administration while dealing with academic matters gives weightage to the recommendations of the Teachers Council and various sub-committees.

- The Teachers Council.


**The college office** mainly looks into matters related to admissions, eligibility and accounts. It also provides clerical support required for maintaining records and for interaction with government, university, UGC and students.

### Give a broad description of the quality improvement strategies of the institution for each of the following.

• **Teaching and Learning :** One of the strategies for quality improvement in teaching and learning is to make the learning more student-centric. The IQAC frequently collects and analyses the feedback of students on the quality of teaching-learning and provides some suggestions for the improvement. Other initiatives to improve the quality of teaching-learning processes in the college are as follows:

(a) Providing Enhanced learning infrastructure - LCD projector and interactive boards with internet. b) Latest equipments in sufficient numbers in Science Laboratories (d) Concept of -Add-On || and -New || practicals for some basic science subjects that (e) Skill enhancement of the students with computer training, use of e learning laboratory. (e) Special lectures / Seminars/ workshops for students. (f) Field studies/study tours. (h) Facilities like INFLIBNET for teachers.

• **Research & Development:** (a) Setting up of Central Research Facility (b) Assigning specific roles and responsibilities to the Research Committee (RC) to look after all matters related with research. (c) Generating awareness amongst the researchers and providing support related to various proposal formats of different funding agencies, budget, purchases of equipment and material under research schemes, account and audit of project expenditure, any additional infrastructure requirements of the researcher etc. (d) Help all the teachers/ researchers in understanding recent updates of their publications in terms of citation index, h-index, etc., (e) Collaborating/partnering with research institutes/ University departments etc. (f) Providing seed money to budding researchers.

#### • Community Engagement

The college always looks for opportunities to modify and improve the extra-curricular/extension activities for the benefit of the community. Some of the initiatives in this direction are as. (a) NSS units organises a winter camp in a nearby adopted village. As a part of the camp, students conduct surveys related to rural development, drinking water, health, girl-child education, socio-economic studies etc. (b) Students from NCC, NSS and other volunteer groups conduct several programmes for the benefit of the society like Blood donation camp, Aids awareness, Gender sensitivity, Anti-dowry, Child marriage etc.

#### Human Resource Management

(a) There are 59 sanctioned posts of teaching out of which 39 are filled up and 43 posts of nonteaching staff have been filled up out of 65 sanctioned posts. (b) Recruitment is in compliance with UGC, University and State Government rules. (c) Regular performance appraisal of teaching and nonteaching staff is done. (d) Training is arranged for teaching as well as nonteaching staff. **Industry Interaction: Nil** 

#### How does the Head of the institution ensure that adequate information (from feedback and personal contacts etc.) is available for the top management and the stakeholders, to review the activities of the institution?

The Principal ensures that adequate information is communicated to the top management and stake holders. The Principal collects information through various meetings like forum of heads, IQAC, as well as from the minutes of meetings of different statutory/non- statutory committees. This information is placed before the local management committee of the college. The college uses the data and information obtained from the feedback in decision making and performance improvement. This is obtained through questionnaires given to students and staff members of the

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college on academic as well as on campus experience. A team of teachers takes review with reference to requirements of every department and gives a feedback to the Principal, who presents this to the LMC for appropriate action. Developments in the college are also communicated to the parents and alumni during their meetings. Suggestion Boxes are placed at prominent locations in the campus. This is a continuous source of suggestions for improvement of infrastructure and services. The concerned sections/departments/ persons are informed about their feedback for improvement or for encouragement and appreciation.

### How does the management encourage and support involvement of the staff in improving the effectiveness and efficiency of the institutional processes?

The staff is entrusted the responsibility for different tasks such as college admissions, examinations, document verifications, form collection for scholarships, Rail/bus concessions as well as handling the university/government correspondence. In addition to the involvement of faculty members in the various academic and administrative committees, there is always a representation and support of the non-teaching staff for all these activities.

### Enumerate the resolutions made by the Management Council in the last year and the status of implementation of such resolutions.

The following are some of the important G.B. resolutions have been adopted during 2015-16 academic session and their status of implementation is given below -

- The G.B resolved to apply for PG courses, Applications for opening of PG in five subjects have been duly sent to the West Bengal Council of Higher Education for approval.
- The G.B resolved to initiate Biometry for monitoring attendance of all staff members which has already been implemented.
- The G.B resolved to install solar lights and CCTV in the entire campus, the process of installation is nearing completion.
- The G.B resolved to allocate funds for repair of hostel buildings, replacement of pipelines in hostel and also to allocate funds for construction of a cycle stand, animal house and boundary wall around the hostels from the college fund. All these works have been completed.
- G.B resolved that a proposal be sent to Paschimanchal Unnyan Parshad for construction of concrete road inside the campus; the proposal was sent and has been approved by the said body. The construction work is ongoing.

## Does the affiliating university make a provision for according the status of autonomy to an affiliated institution? If \_yes', what are the efforts made by the institution in obtaining autonomy?

Yes. The college has discussed the issue in different statutory committees and participated in workshops conducted by state agencies. However, a concrete decision in this regard could not be taken in this regard.

## How does the Institution ensure that grievances / complaints are promptly attended to and resolved effectively? Is there a mechanism to analyze the nature of grievances for promoting better stakeholder relationship?

The Governing Body forms a Grievance Redressal Cell (GRC) to address grievances /complaints and resolve them. This committee addresses grievances of both teaching and non teaching staff members. The mechanism to handle grievances by the Grievance Redressal Committee is as

## Does the Institution have a mechanism for analyzing student feedback on institutional performance? If \_yes', what was the outcome and response of the institution to such an effort?

Student feedback is taken from the final year students of all departments after their final internal assessment examination. The feedback format is designed by the IQAC after taking feedback from faculty members and the data generated is analysed graphically. Principal interacts on a one to one basis with the faculty members with the analyzed feedback. The feedback is reviewed in the academic committee and IQAC for taking concrete steps if necessary.

#### **Faculty Empowerment Strategies**

### What are the efforts made by the institution to enhance the professional development of its teaching and non-teaching staff?

The institution makes deliberate efforts for enhancing professional skills amongst its teaching and non teaching staff. This is achieved by organizing In-House training programmes for teachers as well as deputing teachers for training at Centres of Higher Learning and Excellence. This has been a routine practice of the college Administration and Management. The college grants special study leave for teachers who wish to avail

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training programmes at various institutions/centres/universities and Research Laboratories. There is a budget allocation to encourage our faculties to persue research work, attend and present papers in seminars and workshops. Research being one of the priorities of the Institution, the faculty is engaged in a process of continuous research activities by conducting Major Research Projects, Minor Research Projects, participating in National and International Seminars and Workshops. Further, the teachers also act as Resource persons in seminars, workshops, etc. conducted by other colleges/universities. They also regularly attend Orientation Programmes,

Periodic staff training programme for skill development and computer awareness are held. For non-teaching staff, in house skill development trainings are held.

## What are the strategies adopted by the institution for *faculty empowerment* through training, retraining and motivating the employees for the roles and responsibility they perform.

The authority always encourages and promotes the participation of the faculties in different refresher courses, orientation programs, workshops and seminars. This is evident from the participation of a large number of faculties every year. The Seminar Committee of the College arranges National level and State level Seminars, Workshops and Conferences funded by UGC, DST and DBT with the involvement of the faculty members. The Research Committee which keeps record of all the research proposals submitted by the faculty members. The faculty members of the College are also engaged in various activities of academic leadership. Faculty members act as member of Board of studies, meber of IQAC of other colleges, as Head Examiner, Examiner, Scrutiniser, Paper setter, Moderator, Coordinator and Counsellor of Distance Education programmes etc.

#### Provide details on the performance appraisal system of the staff to evaluate and ensure that information on multiple activities is appropriately captured and considered for better appraisal.

The Institution maintains Daily Self Appraisal System in which each Faculty keeps a record of number of days present, number of classes allotted and taken, number of Seminars / Workshops/ attended, other academic as well as administrative activities inside and outside College. These Self Appraisal Reports of each teacher are submitted to the Principal every month by each department. The faculties also submit the performance Appraisal Report at the end of each academic session. Any problems/ short coming/ potentialities found in the report are sorted out and discussed in different authorised bodies to solve / explore for further development in teaching/ research/ extension activities.

Appraisal of performance of the non-teaching staff has been introduced for considering his/her performance at the time of promotion. Moreover the Heads of departments are authorized to bring to the notice of the Principal instances of negligence of duty and any other grievance against any employee. The Principal looks out to such allegations and complaints promptly and takes necessary action as per service rules. If there is any need of disciplinary action necessary procedure are followed.

What is the outcome of the review of the performance appraisal reports by the management and the major decisions taken? How are they communicated to the appropriate stake holders.

Appraisal of performance of the teaching staff is considered by the Selection Committee for promotion in CAS (Career Advancement Scheme).

What are the welfare schemes available for teaching and non-teaching staff? What percentage of staff have availed the benefit of such schemes in the last four years?

We have a registered staff co-operative which provides loan facility in emergency to all our staff members at a low interest. The permanent employees of the College are entitled to the General Provident Fund and Group Insurance Scheme.

### 6.5.6 What are the measures taken by the Institution for attracting and retaining eminent faculty?

As we are a government sponsored institution, the recruitment process is controlled by the College Service Commission, West Bengal. However the management provides a friendly and healthy environment for our faculties so that qualified and efficient faculties are encouraged to remain in the institution.

#### 6.4 Financial Management and Resource Mobilization

### 6.4.1 What is the institutional mechanism to monitor effective and efficient use of available financial resource?

The College Finance Committee, Purchase Committee, Building Committee etc. monitor the effective and efficient use of the available financial resources. Financial decisions are taken by the finance committee constituted by the Governing Body and are supervised by the Principal, the President of the G.B., Convenor and other members of the finance committee and lastly by the bursar. The Finance Committee has some own rules, which are strictly followed for the development of the college. Different proposal and planning from different corners of the College are submitted to the finance committee. The finance committee allocates budget according to the available financial resources and the College Purchase Committee strictly monitors all purchases of the College. Building Committee monitors all the matters regarding college building construction. The decisions which are taken by these committees are send to G.B. for approval. After the approval of G.B. the decisions are implemented. By this process institutional mechanism monitor the effective and efficient use of available financial resources.

### What are the institutional mechanisms for internal and external audit? What was the last audit done and what are the major audit objections? Provide the details on compliance.

For the internal audit, the institution has a mechanism for day to day check up of accounts of the College including collection, disbursement and posting. Scrutinizing of the expenses is also done as per the prescribed schedule of the utilization of grants. Verification of Provident Fund accounts, Income tax payment account, life insurance premium, Ioan accounts, etc. are done regularly. The external audit happens according to Government rules. The audit of the financial year 2012-2013 has been completed. The audit of the financial year 2013-2014 is ongoing and the audit of 2014-2015 is under process.

What are the major sources of institutional receipts/funding and how is the deficit managed. Provide audited income and expenditure statement of academic and administrative activities of the previous four years and the reserve fund/corpus available with institutions, if any.

The major sources of institutional funding are State Government, UGC and Vidyasagar University and income from the students of the College. The Budget allocations are made on the basis of these funding. The instructions of funding agencies are strictly followed in regarding fund allocations. We normally try to avoid the deficit of the budget. If so, then we have to manage the requirements with the source of fund purely on need based method after discussing with the competent authorities.

Yes, the institution has an integrated framework for quality assurance of the academic and administrative activities. It is basically built on the quality policy of the institution in which categorical commitment to quality assurance is pronounced. The IQAC further conceptualized and operationalized the integrated framework for quality assurance of the academic and administrative activities of the institution based on this institutional policy on quality.

The IQAC carried out the conceptualization of the framework of SWOC analysis with teaching and non teaching staff members during its interaction meetings. Workshops on the use of modern teaching aids in teaching learning process were conducted at regular intervals by the IQAC. The administrative staff were given training on specific software package and internet.

Yes, the institution conducts Academic Audit of all the departments for preparation of reports to be submitted to Department of Higher Education for necessary action. The outcomes of the audits have definitely helped to improve the activities of the departments in particular and the institution in general. The Principal of the College also reviews the Daily Performance Reports maintained by the faculty members in specific format.

Academic committee constituted by the governing body holds regular meetings to analyse the teaching learning process and recommends various measures in accordance with the guidelines of NAAC and Vidyasagar University for Quality enhancement. The results of each department, attendance record and related academic matters of the students are reviewed in these meetings and suitable measures are adopted.

Student feedback is taken every year from the final year students and analysis of this feedback is a measure to review the teaching learning process.

Parent meet organized in each department itself gives a platform for getting a feedback on the various activities of the department and a report is prepared by each department which is forwarded to the IQAC for necessary action.

Feedback from the students, parents and alumni are analysed in the IQAC and forwarded to G.B whenever a problem is identified for taking necessary measures.

#### 7 Innovations and Best Practices

#### **Environment Consciousness**

#### Does the Institution conduct a Green Audit of its campus and facilities?

Raja N.L. Khan Women's College is situated in a green environment. More than eighty percent of our campus is covered by many types of trees. However we use renewable energy in the form of Solar light in our campus and solar power generation for providing hot water to the hostels. Organic farming is done in the campus. We have no formal mechanism for Green Audit. However, efforts have been made to create an eco-friendly atmosphere inside the campus by placing incinerator (machine for waste disposal). Strategies have been developed and adopted to exercise a substantial impact on the preservation of natural resources for the sustainable development of the society with appropriate life-support. Being positioned in the lap of the nature of rural Bengal, the college itself is renowned for its tranquil and serene environment which nourishes the minds of the young learners and employees with its benign impact. Tremendous emphasis is put on the maintenance of the greeneries of the campus. Apart from this there is also a well-maintained garden of medicinal plants.

For creation of eco-friendly atmosphere and sensitizing the stakeholders like students, staff members towards environmental issues, the college spends a significant amount of money. A number of gardeners look after the plants inside the campus. The students of NSS and NCC units undertake cleaning, environmental awareness, social awareness, plantation programmes etc. in the college campus and adjoining locality regularly. The college Eco-club also organizes plantation programmes and celebrates World Environment Day to sensitize all concerned to issues like environmental degradation, preservation of natural resources, global warming, climate change etc. The entire campus has been declared –No Plastic, No Tobacco and No Horn Zonell.

#### What are the initiatives taken by the college to make the campus eco-friendly?

Raja N.L. Khan Women's College has adopted several environment-friendly practices to make the campus eco-friendly. Such practices include:

**Energy Conservation**: Care is taken to ensure that the class rooms get sufficient natural light and air to reduce the need for artificial lighting and cooling. The institution ensures that no electric equipment run unnecessarily. We are taking proper initiative to save energy by using power saving tubes, CFL, and fans with lower consumption. Old computer monitors are replaced to a great extent by LCD/LED Monitors to reduce the level of radiation. Fluorescent tubes are being replaced by LED bulbs in a phase wise manner. Kirloskar branded green generators are used for smoke free and noise free standard frequency energy resource. Energy consumption in the hostel is closely monitored by turning off power during day time and CFL sets are installed to minimize the consumption of energy. Recently we installed solar heating based system for heating of water for supply to hostels.

**Use of Renewable Energy**: The College has installed solar energy panels in the campus itself and solar lamps have been installed in different sections of the college campus.

**Rainwater Harvesting System** has been established in the campus utilizing a pond already inside the campus.

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The College has created a number of **parking places** for the parking of the vehicles of the students and staffs near the entrance so that carbon-emitting vehicles cannot enter a long way inside the campus. Care is taken to keep the campus smoke free. Awareness programmes regarding the menace of excessive production of Carbon-dioxide are organized by the NSS units of the college. We have also installed low carbon-emitting Kirloskar branded green generators in our college.

**Plantation:** though our campus is full of green, we can boast of having well-maintained gardens rich in a variety of flowers, herbal and medicinal plants. Students of the college not only clean the garden but take initiatives to nourish the trees as well as newly planted trees and the flowering plants. Beyond the boundaries of our campus also, our plantation programme is extended. NSS units participate in plantation programme along roadsides of our adopted villages, in and outside of our campus.

**Waste Management:** The College does not generate hazardous waste to a great extent. Solid wastes are disposed in closed containers stationed at various points within the college premises and they are regularly cleaned away by paid staff. Recently we installed two incinerators within our campus to dispose the solid waste. Emphasis is put on the purchases of bio-degradable equipment. Hazardous effluents from laboratories of certain departments are disposed in the pits dug in the ground which are covered safely so that they cannot cause any harm.

**E-waste Management**: Electronic waste, such as discarded computers, office electronic equipment and refrigerators etc. are stored in a separate area and disposed off as per their conditions. Controlling Visual Pollution the College has adopted a strict disciplinary approach to prevent visual pollution. A concerted and determined effort of all stakeholders has also been successful to a certain extent in debarring the outsiders from writing or sticking advertisements/bills on the boundary wall.

#### 7.2 INNOVATIONS

### 7.2.1 Give details of innovations introduced during the last four years which have created a positive impact on the functioning of the college.

During the last four years, the institution has introduced innovations in almost every sphere which have exerted a positive influence on the smooth functioning and progress of the college. Some of these innovations include:

• Use of ICT in Teaching-Learning: All departments have been equipped with Smart Class Technology. Faculties of almost all departments use LCD projectors in classes and have been accustomed to taking classes through Power Point Presentation. All the departments have been provided with sufficient computers and internet connection. The faculty can also avail of the internet facility in their respective departments.

• **Infrastructural Innovations**: Almost all departments have been provided with separate staff enclosures and classrooms. This necessary change in the sitting arrangement of the faculty has provided the faculty a scope to utilize their time in the best possible way.

• **Computerization of the Office and Library**: The college office has been computerized to a great extent. The administrative staff members have been properly trained to run the daily activities of office through computer. The college library has also been computerised.

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• Feedback Mechanism: The College has maintained the practice of collection of feedback from the stakeholders like parents, students and alumni. Analysis of such feedback help the college authority and faculty understand different areas of their strengths and weaknesses which later on contribute to the modification of policies and adoption of requisite measures.

• **Preparatory courses for competitive examinations** The College provides coaching to the enthusiastic students for appearing in competitive examinations for entry into jobs like School Service, Civil Service etc. through the Career Counselling Cell.

• Psychological Counselling Cell offers counseling by experts.

• Organization of Students' Seminars and Workshops: During last five years, organization of National and State Level Seminars and Workshops has been a special feature of a many departments.

• **Research Promotion and Research Journal**: The College has encouraged research works by teachers. At present a number of Major Research project and Minor Research Projects are being run by the faculty members. The College has launched research journals one for Science and the other for Humanities which offers the faculty members scopes for getting their research articles published.

• Website: Meeting the requirements of the changing time, the institution has updated its website www.rnlkcollege.org.in. All the relevant information regarding the institution and its activities has been made available on it.

• **E-Journals and E-Books**: Our College Library has made these facilities available to our faculty, staff and students through INFLIBNET membership.

- **E learning laboratory and Digital language laboratory** is available for reference work and enhancing communicative skill respectively of the students.
- Mathematical Gallery creates a unique learning experience.

• Laboratory Up-gradation: Laboratories of the Departments of Science Stream and Geography have been shifted to large and ventilated rooms. Folkloristics Museum, Gurukul, Psychology, Language Lab, History Museum, Pictorial Gallery of glorious women, Zoological Museum, Botanical Museum and Anatomy Museum has been build up to support the academics.

• Adoption of Measures to Ensure Availability of Safe and Cold Drinking Water.

- Installation of Silent Generators at Different Sections of the College Building.
- Establishment of Basket Ball Court, Badminton Court, Kho Kho Court.
- Gymnasium.
- Creation of Medicinal Garden.
- Introduction of Wi-Fi in the Campus.
- Installation of Closed Circuit Television to Intensify Security.
- Identity Card for Staff and Students.

#### • Biometric system of attendance.

### • Organization of Gender Sensitization Programs by the Women's Cell and Equal Opportunity Centre

- An **Animal Care unit** conducts sterilization and vaccination of all stray animals in the campus in collaboration with Antarik-Social welfare Organisation, A NGO working for animal welfare as per the guidelines of the State Goberment and Ministry of Environment and Forest, Government of India.
- We provide **Tutorial and Remedial classes** for the weak students on every weekends.
- We have made compulsory for all the students to take a free course in Computers and Spoken English. We also provide Optional courses in Dance and Soft Toy Making. Through NSS and Career Advancement Centre, we are organising Self Defence Courses, Yoga and First Aid Course. We also provide extended services in the areas of Literacy and Health.
- E cell and Alumni association of our college \_Balaka' helps our ex students by organising training on Art and Craft and exhibitions on regular basis to sell the handicrafts made by the students to boost their economic status.

#### 1. Title of the Practice: Environmental consciousness

#### 2. Goal

To generate a sense of belonging to Mother Nature, to preserve the greenery in the campus that creates a beautiful ambience for learners as well as the teachers.

#### 3. The Context

Raja Narendra Lal Khan Women's College is situated in the rural area of Kankabati Gram Panchayat having a campus area of 46.86 acres covered by lush green vegetation. Our campus has nearly thousand species of plants and attracts many species of birds among other animals. The college administrative building which was built during 1890's has been declared as a heritage building by W.B Heritage Commission. Being positioned in the lap of the nature of rural Bengal, the college itself is renowned for its tranquil and serene environment which nourishes the minds of the young learners and employees with its benign impact. Tremendous emphasis is put on the maintenance of the greeneries of the campus. The unique environment of our college is appreciated not only by the stakeholders but has attracted the attention and admiration of nearly all person visiting the college from outside.

#### 4. The Practice

**1. Solar Power Generation**: Five solar power grids have been installed in the five hostels of our college for heating water for supply to hostels. This reduces power consumption and less use of LPG in the hostels.

**2. Installation of solar lights**: Solar lights have been installed in different points of the campus for reducing electricity consumption and reducing pollution by conventional light sources.

**3.** Use of inceranators in waste disposal: Several inceranators have been installed in the hostel toilets as well as in the toilets in the main campus for disposal of sanitary napkins for a clean environment.

**4. Installation of Green generators**: Three green generators have been installed which cause lesser pollution in terms of emission of smoke and production of .sound

5. Replacement of fluorescent lights with LED bulbs is being done in a phase wise manner.

**6. Organic farming** has been initiated in the campus with vermicompost produced in the campus.

7. Water harvesting through a pond excavated regularly is practiced in the College.

**8.** An Animal Care unit conducts sterilization and vaccination of all stray animals in the campus in collaboration with Antarik-Social welfare Organisation, a NGO working for animal welfare as per the guidelines of the State Government and Ministry of Environment and Forest, Government of India.

8. Functioning of Eco club and plantation programmes: Eco club promotes many activities for preservation of the greenery and regular plantation programmes are carried out and more than hundred trees re planted every year.

#### 5. Evidence of Success

The lush green campus and its serene environment is itself an evidence of its conservation. Recently conducted biodiversity surveys by the Department of Botany and Zoology also gives evidence of the fact that the number of species of flora and fauna has been well conserved in the last few years.

#### 6. Problems Encountered and Resources Required

To conserve the environment, alternate sources of energy and conservation strategies for preserving rare species of plants present in the campus needs to be done. This requires financial support, expertise and manpower.



# REPORT OF THE PEER TEAM ON INSTITUTIONAL ASSESSEMNT AND ACCREDITATION OF

## RAJA NARENDRALAL KHAN WOMEN'S COLLEGE MIDNAPUR (WEST BENGAL)

### SECTION I : INTRODUCTION

Raja Narendralal Khan Women's College, was established in the Gope Palace of Midnapur in the year 1957 to provide education and enlightment among the women of the district of Midnapur. The College is providing courses in Arts and Science leading to the Bachelor's degree. The college affiliated to the Vidyasagar University, (which is also situated at Midnapur) is situated in a rural area in a lush green campus spread over an area of 48.82 acres. The institution was recognised under 2(f) and 12 B of the UGC Act, of 1956. The college enjoys the grant-inaid status of the Government of West Bengal.

The college functioning in an heritage building is named after the Zamindar Raja Narendralal Khan and was the nucleus of the freedom movement during the British rule. It was visited by important national leaders like Mahatma Gandhi, Netaji Subhas Chandra Bose and Pandit Jawaharlal Nehru. The College was established with the blessings and initiative of the then Chief Minister of West Bengal Dr. Bidhan Chandra Roy, who inaugurated the college on 22<sup>nd</sup> August, 1957.

The college offers 20 programme options at the under graduate level of which there are 19 Pass and 17 Honours courses and 4 vocational self financed courses. It has 20 departments : Physics, Chemistry, Mathematics, Zoology, B. C. A., Physiology, Microbiology, Sericulture, Computer Science and Botany under the Faculty of Science and English, Bengali, Sanskrit, Economics, History, Hindi, Geography, Political Science, Philosophy and Music under the Faculty of Arts. Out of these, Honours course is offered in the subjects of Botany, Chemistry, Computer Science, Physics, Microbiology, Physiology, Zoology and Mathematics in Science and English, Bengali, History, Geography, Philosophy Sanskrit, Music, Economics and Political Science in Arts. The Honours courses in Microbiology, and Computer Science and the Pass courses in B. C. A. and Sericulture are run under a self financing scheme. The College has been recently given affiliation by the University to run the M. Sc. course in Zoology. The college imparts higher education up to the graduation and post graduation level for girls. There are 95 teachers, of whom 40 are on full-time permanent basis and 55 as guest teachers. Out of 40 permanent teachers 21 are Ph. D Degree holders, and 3 M.Phil degree holders. The number of non-teaching staff is 43, out of which 20 are administrative and 23 are technical. In the year 2003-2004, the student strength consisted of 2044 girls. Most of the students are drawn from the State of West Bengal, while only a few students come from other States.

The total number of working days conforms to the UGC norms. The support services include Central Library, Medical Unit, Sports facilities, Canteen, Cycle Shed, Hostels, Common Room, Guest House, Gymnasium, a store, Generator, two busses, water supply facility, and also full and half feeship for needy and meritorious students. They also have a staff room for teachers, a grievance redressal cell and in-campus accommodation. Besides it has one N. C. C. unit and three units of N. S. S. It also has a research unit called Centre for Natural Studies (C. N. S.).

NAAC PEER TEAM REPORT - RAJA N. L. KHAN WOMEN'S COLLEGE

The college volunteered to be assessed by NAAC, Bangalore, and prepared the Self Study Report which was submitted to NAAC. A Peer Team was constituted by the NAAC to visit the College and validate the Self- Study Report. The Peer Team consisting of Professor S. N. Behera, former Vice-Chancellor of Berhampur University, presently at Bhubaneswar, as Chairperson; Prof. Radhika Raman Sahay, formar Professor of Philosophy and Dean of the Faculty of Humanities, Patna University, as member Coordinator; and Prof. Harvir Sharma, Emeritus Professor, in Defence Studies, University Grant Commission at Meerut, Uttar Pradesh, as Member, visited the institution on 10<sup>th</sup> and 11<sup>th</sup> September 2004.

Prior to the visit, the Peer Team had carefully gone through the Self Study Report submitted by the College and made a detailed analysis of the facts and figures. During the visit, the team went through all the relevant documents, visited all the departments and laboratories, held discussions with the members of the teaching staff and perused the available facilities of all the Departments as well as the support services of the college. The team also interacted with the members of the Governing Body, the Principal, the members of the non-teaching staff, students, parents and alumni. The academic, co-curricular, sports and extension facilities were reviewed. The Peer Team has drawn up its conclusions on the basis of the above exercise keeping in mind the criteria identified by NAAC. The assessment of the college under various criteria, the commendable features as well as the issues of concern are given below.

# SECTION II : CRITERION-WISE ANALYSIS Criterion I : Curricular Aspects.

The college is required to follow the academic and examination patterns and syllabi determined by Vidyasagar University. The University holds two examinations on the Annual pattern Part I at the end of the second year (on the courses taught in the first two years), and Part II at the end of the third year. In addition of their Honours subjects, the Honours students study two subjects of the general stream for the Part I examination, whereas the general students study three subjects for the Part I and Part – II examination. The college is opening value based education alongwith traditional academic Programmes. The institution is providing (Hons.) degree in Arts and Science. Workshops and seminars are being organised by some of the departments to enriched the academic status of the institution. Exchange programes are organised at the local level and the guest lecturers from local colleges and other institutions are invited to engage classes in the college and the teachers of this college extends their services by engaging classes in other institutions.

The senior faculty members get the opportunity of making suggestions in respect of the design and structure of courses when invited to the consultative workshops on curricula and syllabi organised by the University. Most of the H.O.Ds are member of the Board of studies of their respective subjects. The syllabi do not yet have scope for the "horizontal mobility" of students. Due to high workload on the teachers and constraints imposed by the timetable and classroom shortage, the college is not able to offer all the possible subject combination smoothly. The college also provides instructions for the compulsory non-core

papers in Bengali (or Alternative English, for those whose mother-tongue is not Bengali) and English for the Part I examination and Environmental Studies for the Part II examination.

Within the fame work of University regulations, the College has taken some innovative initiatives. Although the University syllabi are not on the unit pattern, the teachers of several Departments have unitized course contents and the units are communicated to students in the beginning of the session. Instead of one home examination on the annual pattern at the end of the first year, the college has instituted a semester type modality in the first two years, holding (in the manner of the semester system) the first year home examination in two segments and another home examination around middle of the second year. This helps the students to prepare more systematically and benchmark their readiness for the Part I examination.

## CRITERION - II : Teaching - Learning and Evaluation.

Students admission is done through academic needs. The college has audiovisual aids like OHP, Slide Projector, TV and Epidiascopes. Teaching days is the college is 220, working days is 260. The college has the provision for assessing the overall performance of students. The full time teachers are recruited through the West Bengal College Service Commission and the guest teachers are appointed by the Governing Body college as per university and Govt. norms. Out of 40 permanent teachers, 21 are Ph. D holders and 03 M. Phil Degree holders. 14 teachers have attended UGC Refresher Courses and 12 seminars of which 02 are at international level during the last two years. 04 Minor Research Projects have been undertaken by the college faculty. Research linkages are with Ford Foundation, I.I.Se, Bangalore, I.C.F.R.E.,MOEF,Govt. of India etc. NAAC PEER TEAM REPORT - RAIA N.L.KHAN WOMEN'S COLLEGE 5 At the National level a number of teachers have participated in Seminars and a few at international level. The college follows the self appraisal method to evaluate the performance of the faculty in teaching, research and institutional programmes.

Under faculty development programme the faculty members of the college attended 14 Refresher Courses, 5 Orientation Programmes. A few faculty members received Minor Research Project and Major Research Project. The number of minor and major research projects allotted to the college are 6.

The teaching staff is being motivated to carry out research investigations in their respective fields. Also, the students are being encouraged to attain symposia organised institution the campus and to attend excursion particularly in the subjects of Geography, Botany and Zoology. Training aids in respect of laboratories are being provided to the students in the Basic Sciences and Humanities.

## Criterion III - Research, Consultancy and Extension

The college is recognised a Nodal Centre by the Ministry of Environmental and Forest to carry out research. Such Research Centre is known as "Centre for Natural Studies". One N.C.C. unit exists in the college wherein 70 cadets are enrolled. Besides, a large number of students are participating in N.S.S activities throughout the year. There are three units of N.S.S under three programme officers. In Extension activities, the community development, social work, AIDS awareness, adult education and literacy, health and hygiene awareness, blood donation, environmental awareness etc. are being carried out in the NAAC PEER TEAM REPORT - RAJA N L KHAN WOMEN'S COLLEGE 6 college through N.S.S volunteers. The teachers are granted study leave to persue research in the college. The Principal has constituted a Research Committee to look into the project proposals.

The total number of research publications by the faculty members within three years are 33. These publications are either in National or International Journals and books.

Seven faculty members of the college are engaged in active research work and Registered for Ph.D. degree in different Universities of West Bengal.

The following two N.C.C cadets joins Republic Day Parade at New Delhi.

(a) Cadet Papun Bhattacharya - 2003

(b) Cadet Nibedita Saha - 2004

A firing range is also situated in the college campus for N.C.C

Seven research scholors are working for Ph.D degree under the supervision of the teacher of this college.

Two candidates are awarded Ph.D. degree (within two years) under the supervision of teachers of the college-one from Vidyasagar University and another from F.R.I. Dehradun.

The following extension activities are undertaken by the college community development, social work, aid awareness, adult education, literacy, health and hygiene awareness, blood donation, environmental awareness.

The college has a separate Research Laboratory cum extension Centre "Centre for Natural Studies" where research activities and some NAAC PEER TEAM REPORT - RAJA N. L. KHAN WOMEN'S COLLEGE 7

extension activities are carried out. The college has been recognised by the Ministry of Environment and Forest, Government of India as one of the six centers in the country for research in Joint Forest Management activities in active co-ordination with India Institute of Science, Bangalore. The college has the potential to carry out research in the subjects of English, Bengali, Zoology and Geography.

## Criterion IV : Infrastructure and Learning Resources

An affiliated college of Vidyasagar University, Raja Narendralal Khan Women's College is a grant-in-aid college located at Midnapore District - Paschim Medinipur of West Bengal. Located in rural area of Midnapur District, it has 48.82 acres area and established in the year 1957. The College has three separate buildings for classroom and laboratory work of Arts, Pure science and Bio-science, besides Teacher's Common Room, Library building, Staff quarters, Teacher's quarters, seven hostels, Principal quarter and administrative building. A building sub - committee monitors the construction, renovation and extension of these buildings. The maintenance of buildings are done out of funds generated from student at the time of admission, besides UGC grants, States Govt. grants and grants from local civic bodies. The office of the college runs in the historical palace of Raja Narendralal Khan, the erstwhile King of Narajole. The palace houses the administrative block and the Principal quarter. To preserve the palace as a heritage building, the college authority has submitted a proposal of new administrative building to the U. G. C. in the 10th plan period.

Besides holding its own classes, the college also runs a study center of Netaji Subhas Open University during weekend without NAAC PEER TEAM REPORT - RAJA N. L. KHAN WOMEN'S COLLEGE 8

disrupting its own activities. It also provides its premises for holding various competitive examinations during holidays and Sunday, eg, school service commission & primary school service commission etc. The revenue collected so is used for the maintenance of the infrastructure.

The college has a Central Library with about 28,000 books, a reading room and book bank facility. Besides, Library has reprography, computers, audio – video cassettes and internet facilities as well. The working days of Library is six days in a week from 10.30 a.m. to 4.45 p. m. except holidays and vacation. The Library runs with the help of an Advisory Committee. The college has total 37 computers including 10 in B. C. A. department, 14 in Computer Science department and 5 in general office and rest in different departments. These computers are maintained by the agency through which the computers are purchased. The college has students Health Home in which two doctors visit periodically for consultation and general health cheek up.

The college has one P. T. I. who supervises various games in the college. The college provides various sports and games equipments to the students with facility of play ground, cricket ground, volley ball ground, badminton court, kho-kho & kabadi court and athletics tracks. Three students of the college participated at the state level games last year. There are seven hostel in the college accommodating about 386 students. The hostel publishes its separate prospects containing detail rules for boarders.

Since the college is in the grant-in-aid category, faculty members are appointed by the West Bengal College Service Commission. Non-

teaching staff and guest teachers are appointed by the Governing Body according to statutory provision.

### Criterion V : Student Support and Progression

The college publishes its updated prospectus annually containing short history of the college, aims and objectives, admission criterion, choice of subjects, number of seats, fee structure, eligibility criterion, hostel information, examination schedule etc. The students are admitted in the college as per norms of the University / Government.

Besides the scholarships and financial help provided by the Govt. the college extends full freeship and half freeship and financial help to poor and meritorious students. Various awards and incentives are given to students having extra ordinary performances out of the accured interest of various term deposites available with the institution. Besides, college maintains a link with some NGOs to help the financially disadvantaged students.

The college has an Alumni Association "Balaka Praktani Samsad" which helps to maintain a continuous link between the college and exstudents. Some of its members are holding important faculty positions in leading Universities of U. S. A., U. K., Japan & Singapore. One of its member is currently posted as Director, Centre of Himalyan Studies. In the last five years three students passed NET, two students passed GATE, one student TOFEL and eight students SLET examinations.

The college collect feedback from students which is used to develop the teaching learning process of the college. The teachers and NAAC PEER TEAM REPORT - RAJA N. L. KHAN WOMEN'S COLLEGE 10

students of this college maintain a healthy relationship by interacting and exchanging ideas. The teachers always help and guide the students in their personal and academic matters.

The college provides the following leisure-time facilities to the students. Indoor and outdoor games, nature and debate clubs, magazines, Audio-video facility, cultural programmes, essay writing, dance-music competition etc. It also organised Poster Competition. The college publishes its academic calendar in the beginning of the session. Though the college does not have a career counseling cell, yet the faculty members are in constant touch with students to advise them regarding their career prospects. The following support services are available in the college : Central Library, Computer Centre, Health Home, Indoor & Outdoor game facilities, Canteen, Hostel, Cycle shed, Vehicle Parking shed etc.

The college has a Student's Union. The election is held annually and the elected General Secretary of the Student's Union in one of the ex-officio members of the Governing Body.

There is a Grievance Redressal cell in the college for students. A suggestion box is placed to receive any kind of complaints from students and suitable remedial measures are taken by the concerned authority.

The pass percentage of the students is high which speaks about competent academic counselling. Drop out rate is 20.66% in batch 1 and 05.09% in Batch 2. The success rate is 83.31% in Batch I while 86.59% in Batch 2.

The N. S. S. and N. C. C. units of the college undertakes good number of activities, eg, community services, campus cleaning and training students in discipline and combat pratices.

The college not only provides class room teachings to its students but required facilities for their all round development. College magazine is published regularly. Students by contributing articles in magazine get a scope to develop their creative talents. Various competitions like dance, music, debate, outdoor & indoor games, poster, youth parliament and eloquence are regular features of the academic calendar of the institution.

The Peer Team appreciates the efforts of the college authority to take up various extension activities and provide various leisure-time facilities to the students. Alumni Association appears to be active but it is suggested that more meaningful interaction between the alumni and parents may be encouraged to get a critical feedback which can be utilized for the improvement of the institution. A strong relation between the alumni and the college will help the institution in generation of funds and placement and training opportunities for students.

## Criterion VI : Organisation and Management

The Governing Body of the college has set up seven Standing Committees. The Teacher's Council, a statutory body of the college, has set up 22 sub-committies for day to day functioning of the college. These committees are formed in the beginning of the session in the Teacher's Council meeting which comprises members of the teaching & non-teaching staff. These committees co-ordinate and monitor the

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college management. Members of the teaching staff are assigned to look after various administrative work and guide the non-teaching staff in their day to day functioning. In this way the work efficiency of the non-teaching staff is checked.

There is a committee which prepares the academic as well as cocurricular calendar in the beginning of the session. The Principal and various Head of the Departments supervise the effective implementation of the academic and co-curricular activities. Principal and Heads hold frequent meetings to assess the effective implementation of the calendar and judge the work efficiency of the teachers. During the last three years the tuition fees of various courses has been enhanced.

The college has a Grievance Redressal cell for students which meets periodically for the redressal of various complaints of students. The grievances of teaching and non-teaching staff are looked after by a committee formed by the Governing Body.

The following loan facilities are available for the teaching as well as non-teaching staff: (1) interest free loan from their respective G. P. F. (2) Non-refundable loan to employee having 20 years or more service. (3) loan from staff co-operative society.

The college provides various welfare schemes for students and employees. Free studentship is provided to poor and meritorious students and financial assistance to needy and poor students. There is one unit of N. C. C. with 70 cadets and three units of N. S. S. in the college, each units consisting of 100 volunteers. The facility of health cheek up for students is also available.

The staff co-operative society extends financial help in the form of loan to teachers and non-teaching staff as and when required,

The college receives grants from U. G. C. and State Govt. Besides college generates additional revenue by way of enhanced tuition fee and self-financing courses.

The college prepare its annual budget in the beginning of the financial year and all expenditures are made as per budget. For any major purchase, the sanction of purchase committee is required.

The teachers of the college are appointed by the West Bengal College Service Commission through advertisement as per Government rules and roaster. Part time teachers are appointed by the college authority after the fulfillment of required conditions.

The college has a committee headed by the Principal to supervise the Working of the non-teaching staff and to streamline their workefficiency.

Peer team is happy to note the co-operation and cordiality between teachers and non-teaching staff. The peer team further appreciates the communication facilities available to the students in the college. The internet, e-mail, telephone etc are accessible to teachers and students. S.T.D booth and Xerox facilities are available in the college for students and teachers.

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## Criterion VII : Healthy Practices

The college has adopted various mechanism for internal quality checks with reference to academic, administrative and financial issues. The day to day activities are delegated to various committees.

- The Peer Team has noticed the existence of a significant procedure for intimate checking and monitoring of the academic standard of students by holding half yearly test, periodic test in tutorial classes, group discussions and seminars.
- The college also organizes various competitions, eg., Debate, eloquence, recitations, youth parliament, painting, sports and cultural.
- The college has a healthy tradition of holding inter departmental discussions and workshops with active participation by students and teachers.
- The Teacher's Council holds periodical academic meeting to evaluate and introspect on the academic progress of the college.
- 5. The college endeavours to imbibe the students with the values of love, fellow feeling, compassion and responsibility by organizing cultural festivals, debate competitions, seminars and workshops. It also tries to instill a sense of discipline among the students by monitoring their attendance in the classes and their participation in various programmes.
- The various activities undertaken by the N. S. S. volunteers of the college encourages the general students to involve themselves in community activities and discharge various responsibility.
- For all round personality development of students cultural activities, sports and games, debates are organised frequently. The

participation of students in these activities enforce a sense of discipline and decorum among the students which in turn help in the all round development of the personalities of students.

- The college is well equipped to impart latest knowledge to the students on science and technology, besides it also gives due emphasis on study of literature, music and culture of our country.
- To supplement the resources of the college, Departments of B.C.A., Music, Computer Science and Sericulture have been started.
- The college has a ex-situ Medicinal plant garden and a vermicompost unit.

The Peer Team appreciates that the college has been recognised by the Ministry of Environment & Forest, Govt. of India as one the six such Centers in the country for research in Joint Forest Management activities in active co-ordination with Indian Institute of Science, Bangalore. One research scholar of the college has been awarded Ph. D degree from Vidyasagar University and another from FRI, Dehradun.

### SECTION III : OVERALL ANALYSIS

The Peer Team after going through the Self-Study Report and after visits to various academic and physical facilities in the college is of the opinion that the college has earned a reputation for academic soundness and imparting a sense of discipline to the younger generation.

- Encouragement and support given by the Management to the Institution, in maintaining and excellent environment and a lush green ambiance, thus providing an ideal study atmosphere.
- Dedication and commitment of the faculty and non-teaching staff.
- Effective leadership for maintaing good human relationship, between students and teachers.
- Facilitating and promoting student participation in co-curricular activities, social work, community oriented work, personality development programmes, sports and cultural activities.
- The faculty of the college are generally devoted and committed in undertaking many useful activities besides teaching and research, such as field visit, educational tours, arranging seminars, conferences and workshops, and also in bringing eminent academicians from other famous institutions, to address the students and teachers of the college.

The Peer Team would like to suggest the college to consider the following.

- The college may explore a little more the possibility of developing skills through OJT (On Job Training) with GOs (Government Organisations) and private sector firms so that the learning process becomes more intensive and enjoyable.
- Formal mechanism of self- appraisal of teachers be activated at regular intervals.
- Sports may be geared up further, especially with reference to participation by girls of tribal sections with natural affinity for such activities.

- The Alumni Association may be activated further to play a pro-active role in the overall development of the college.
- While the achievements of some faculty members in research are commendable more teachers may be encouraged towards research work and undertaking minor research projects in order to take the College to newer heights of knowledge.
- The Central Library should be enriched with the addition of new books and current journals in all subjects.
- Construction of more girls hostels be taken up on priority basis, keeping in mind the large number of students coming from rural areas.
- Frequent internet access facilities should be made available for students and teachers at subsidised rates.
- The student assessment of the teachers be introduced and incorporated into the overall assessment procedure of the faculty
- Guidance Cell for higher studies and job opportunities be established for the benefit of students.
- While appreciating the efforts of the College in opening post graduate studies in Zoology, the college authority should plan for introducing Post Graduate programmes in few more subjects with strong initiative
- The college should plan to establish a well equipped Computer Centre for providing Computer training to interested students of the College and for promoting Information Technology (IT) enabled education.
- The Office and Library management system need to be further computerized, and more personal trained in use of computers

- For smooth running of the classes and widening the range of available subject combinations, some more Part-time teachers should be appointed, where ever the number of full time teachers is small.
- Considering the availability of excellent infrastructure and academic performance the college is urged to make all out efforts to attain the autonomous status of the UGC.

The Peer Team is impressed by the progress made by the College so far. The Peer Team wishes the College authorities all the best in their efforts to improve the different activities. The team further records its deep appreciation for the whole hearted co-operation, support and goodwill extended to the members of the Peer Team by the Management, the Principal and all the constituents of the College. The Peer Team wishes the College all the best in its efforts to reach to greater heights.
